Warialda school students Honour our Fallen

Honour our Fallen is a not-forprofit company, formed to honour and preserve the memory of those deceased military personnel, buried in Australia, who served our Nation in all conflicts and theatres since the Boer War.

Honour Our Fallen's mission is to perpetuate and honour the memory of all deceased veterans, and starting with our youth, to create pride in our community in the virtues of service to our Nation, and respect for those who died protecting our freedom and way of life.

In partnership with local schools across Australia, students research ex-Service personnel and locate their graves in their local cemetery. Each year for ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day, students from Warialda High School place flags on the graves of the 279 ex-Service men and women buried in the Warialda General Cemetery. Over the last couple of years ANZAC Day has fallen in the school holidays and staff, parents and community members have generously given their time to help place the flags.

Mrs Donna Smith from Warialda High School is the facilitator for **Honour Our Fallen** in Warialda. She would like to thank the NSW Office for Veterans Affairs for the Anzac Community Grant Program and Gwydir Shire Council for providing the funds to

purchase new flags this year for students to place at the cemetery. The students are to be commended on the way they conduct themselves and the respect they show when placing the flags. Last Remembrance Day, after thanking the students, Brandon Tevaga replied, "No Miss, thank you, it was a privilege".

Hundreds gather in Bingara at first light to mark ANZAC Day 2024

ANZAC Day 2024 in Bingara saw some of the largest crowds in years as people came together to reflect on the bravery of those who died and the sacrifices made by our veterans and serving Defence Force members.

ANZAC Day is anational day of commemoration in Australia and New Zealand with 2024 marking 109 years since ANZACS landed at Gallipoli in World War 1.

Adam Marshall delivered a commemorative address on the day, later assisting as two long-serving Bingara RSL members were recognised for their dedicated service. Don and Andrew Mack—who are familiar faces leading the ANZAC Day street march as they play their bagpipes—were presented with RSL NSW Certificates of Appreciation for their 50 and 35 years of respective service to the Bingara RSL Sub Branch.







ANZAC Day Dawn Service commenced at 6.00am followed by breakfast at the Bingara RSL Club. The crowd then gathered at 11.00am to begin the march which made its way to the RSL Memorial Gardens where the wreath laying ceremony by the Sub Branch, the RSL, individuals and various organisations took place.

Formalities aside, it was time to follow up with lunch, live entainment and the great Australian tradition—two up.

Congratulations go to President Peter Kennedy, Secretary Steve Adams and the Bingara RSL Sub Branch members on organising such a wonderful ceremony this year!

Draft Local Housing Strategy

The Draft Local Housing Strategy (LHS) will set a clear plan for housing within the Gwydir Shire over the next 20 years. The LHS is based on the data in the Housing Needs Assessment (HNA) and Community surveys and other council, and regional, policy and strategy documents. The LHS identifies housing needs and the capacity to accommodate population growth and that growing population's needs. It also identifies potential areas and types of housing needed. It outlines and prioritises 13 strategies to support the delivery of housing within the Gwydir Shire over the next 20 years and to achieve the housing vision and objectives outlined in the LHS.

The Draft LHS documents will be on public display for 28 days from Thursday 2 May 2024 to Thursday 30 May 2024. These documents can be viewed at Council's Customer Service Centres in Bingara and Warialda, the Libraries in Bingara and Warialda and the Warialda Council Chambers Office.

There are several special events throughout the year and the service also provides assistance with resume and business letter writing. Young people at risk are invited to attend Youth in Search camps on a regular basis and an annual student exchange with Willoughby Council is also held to give our young people the opportunity to see what life is like in the city and to host students from Willoughby to give them a country experience. We strive to provide a balanced and exciting service for the young people of our Shire.

The role of young people in volunteering

On 16 March 2024 dozens of local community organisations gathered on the new basketball court to present their credentials in an effort to attract new members. The bold initiative was the brainchild of the Bingara and District Historical Society who perceived organisations needed to attract new members to combat the common problem of ageing and natural attrition.

On the day, the Bingara Garden Club was represented by two members and equipped with a small table, chairs, a vase of flowers, give away limes and literature that detailed the Club's historical connections and core activities. Whilst the participation of community organisations was commendable, elusive new aspiring members were largely conspicuous by their absence. However, a couple of potentially interested parties made contact that could yet prove beneficial.

It has been nationally stated that volunteering is sadly in decline almost everywhere. Bingara is no exception. Taking into account that some of the Club's foundation members from the late 1980 are still participating, age, mobility and hearing have become limiting factors. Affiliation, insurance

with the Garden Club of Australian and good housekeeping necessitates certain meeting procedures that some people find disinteresting.

There is an old adage that son will never learn to ride while Dad is in the saddle. The mature age of the Executive of most local organisations, including the Garden Club, is a turn off for young people. Hypothetically, if given the opportunity, could a youthful executive forge a new direction that invigorates membership and drive? Of course, we all know that youth is on the move and maintaining such activity would have more than its fair share of problems. In any event, this vexing issue of ageing and declining membership will eventually reach its natural conclusion unless some sort of remedial intervention takes place in the meantime.

The role young people play in volunteering

- 25% of people aged 18-24 years volunteered formally (through an organisation or group) in 2022. This is an estimated 572,635 volunteers aged 18-24.
- The proportion of people aged 18-24 years who had volunteered formally in the previous 12 months fell from 36.5% in late 2019 to 25.6% in April 2021. This decreased slightly to 25.0 per cent in 2022.
- Volunteers aged 15-24 are more likely than those in other age groups to volunteer for fewer hours. However, the proportion of young volunteers who volunteer for 100 hours or more increased significantly between 2019 and 2020.
- Volunteers aged 18-29 years are more likely than average to volunteer for particular types of organisations, accounting for 37.8% of volunteers in Animal Welfare organisations and 28.8% of volunteers in Health organisations. They are less likely to volunteer for Aged Care (7.5% of volunteers in this sector), Arts/Heritage (9.9%), Environment (12.4%), and Sport/Recreation

(11.3%) organisations.

- Younger people are relatively more likely to volunteer in the field or over the internet, whereas older people are more likely to volunteer in person at the organisation.
- Formal volunteering among young people increased gradually between 2006 to 2016, but decreased significantly between 2016 and 2021, which includes the impact of COVID-19.
- Between April 2021 and April 2022, people aged 18-24 were the only age group for which the rate of formal volunteering did not increase.

On July 8, 1936 the *Bingara Advocate* reported: "The first tournament held on the new tennis courts at the Golf Links took place on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, 27th, 28th and 29th June, when a number of visitors from outside centres were present, and were successful in carrying off trophies."

On June 5, 2015 it was stated in a tennis report that: "It has been 79 years since Bingara held the first June long weekend tennis tournament and while the faces of the tournament committee members and players may have changed, the traditions of the tournament have remained steady.

Over the years this tournament has played host to hundreds of players from all over the country, some of whom went on to become professional tennis players. From what was once a traditional 'boys' weekend of tennis is these days attracting players of all abilities due to the family friendly range of events on offer. Those who grew up with the long weekend ritual of the tennis open are now continuing the tradition with their own children and grandchildren.

In 2021/22 we were fortunate enough to have the top four courts refurbished and completed just in time for the 2022 Bush Bash, whew! They are beautiful synthetic grass and lookin' good and are available for play with an easy user friendly 'honesty box' system for

And now here we are in 2024 the Bingara Bush Bash Open Tennis Championships (formerly called the Bingara Annual Open Tennis Championships) is still running strong 88 years later and are looking forward to, once again, hosting another great tournament of top, entertaining tennis and camaraderie with players from Queensland, Victoria, ACT and all points of NSW (including surrounding towns Warialda, Inverell and Tamworth) competing. It's interesting to note that the only times this tournament did not run was during World War II and during

the Covid-19 lockdown of 2021.

The Sunday night is a Social Evening with Natalie Baker as this years guest artist. Opportunity is also offered to anyone who would like to get up and 'have a go' to do just that.







Communities urged to unveil local healthcare excellence

The peak body for the remote health workforce is calling upon everyday Australians to identify nurses, midwives and other health professionals who deserve the industry's top professional accolade.

The Australian Remote Health Awards are run by the Council of Remote Area Nurses of Australia (CRANAplus) and the not-for-profit organisation wants to hear directly from communities about who is doing a fantastic job, CEO Linda Kensington said.

"Health professionals are the beating heart of many rural and remote Australian communities," Ms Kensington said.

"They are often the difference between good health and ill health – and between life and death in an emergency.

"Community members now have a chance to give back to the healthcare professionals and teams who have had a positive impact on their lives.

"Who better to identify an excellent local nurse or midwife than those who have received their care?"

The awards program aims to raise awareness of the advanced skill set required when working in areas with fewer resources, greater distances, and less support than urban Australia.

It is part of CRANAplus' push for increased resources and investment in healthcare in remote Australia, where healthcare access is often limited.

"Credit where credit is due," Ms Kensington says. "Many healthcare professionals are too busy to nominate their peers and too modest to dob themselves in, but we know we can trust in communities to help them gain the recognition they deserve."

Last year's top award went to Registered Nurse Katie Pennington, who works and lives on the remote east coast of Tasmania. Previous winners have worked in South Australia's APY Lands, New South Wales Far West and Queensland's Cape York, among other locations.

Award winners will be announced at CRANAplus' Remote Nursing and Midwifery Conference in Melbourne this October. There are several award categories to choose from, including the Aurora Award for remote and isolated health professional of the year, and the Collaborative Team Award.


