NSW Electoral Commission Confirms Councillors After Local Government Elections

Gwydir Shire Councillors elected to serve the community have been declared after preference distribution was finalised following Local Government elections held on 14th September. Nine councillors were elected from 14 candidates.

Gwydir residents have put their faith in seven new and two returning councillors* to act in their best interests for the next 4-year term with candidates declared elected by the NSW Electoral Commission on 1st October as follows:

There were 3,854 residential and non-residential electors enrolled in the Gwydir Shire on 5 August 2024, with 3,194 total votes/ballot papers (82.87%) received.

Total Informal Ballot Papers amounted to 214, or 6.7%—a 2.37% increase in informal votes on the 2021 election result.

An informal vote is the result of a ballot paper not being completed correctly. An informal vote doesn't contribute to the election result—only formal votes can be counted and contribute to the election result.

Elected Councillors will now attend the next scheduled Gwydir Shire Council meeting on 17 October when the positions of Mayor and Deputy Mayor will be decided.

Plunkett Street Update

There have been over 20 fruit trees donated to the Community Orchard to be located at the back of the Plunkett Street block. Works are currently being undertaken to prepare for the planting of the trees. Donations have been received from generous individuals from within the Gwydir Shire Council area with one donation coming from a family in Canberra who have watched the progress of the Warialda Community Warriors (WCW) on Facebook and wanted to be a part of the development.

The Warriors will be consulting with horticulture experts to make sure that a good assortment of environmentally suitable trees are included in the orchard. Thank you to those who have already given their support the Warriors. It is hoped that before long this orchard will be giving back to the community.

Op Shop

The building works are nearly completed at the Op Shop building. There are still some minor works needed before the building can be painted internally and the fit out finalised. This work has essentially been done by a team of extraordinary tradespersons volunteers who have given their time to this project as a contribution to the community. These people will be celebrated at the opening of the Op Shop when we have their permission to publicise their contribution.

Council staff have been engaged to undertake some of the works like the removal of the lead paint on the building, securing the building and plumbing.

The WCW has been given a donation from Challenge Disability Services which has been combined with WCW funds raised for the purchase and construction of a three-bay shed to be used for sorting and storing items for the Op Shop. This shed will be on the southern side of the larger building on the block and will form part of the boundary fence allowing access for Challenge staff and participants internally and Op Shop Volunteers externally. A loan was provided by Council for the short fall of funding for the Sorting Shed. It is expected that WCW will have the funds to repay this loan immediately after their next fund raising venture which is the 1960s Ball on the 26 October, 2024 at the Warialda Town Hall.



make tough decisions regarding funding and expenditure.

Effective councillors are actively involved in community engagement. They facilitate open communication between the council and the public, organising public meetings, consultations, and forums to gather feedback and foster a sense of community involvement. This helps build trust and ensures that council decisions are transparent and inclusive.

Councillors are expected to uphold high standards of governance and ethical conduct, adhering to codes of conduct, conflict-of-interest guidelines, and other regulatory requirements to maintain the integrity of their office. This includes making decisions in the best interest of the community and avoiding actions that could undermine public trust.

While the role of a councillor can be challenging, it is also incredibly rewarding. Councillors in NSW local government are essential to the functioning and well-being of their communities. Their roles as advocates, policy makers, financial overseers, communicators, and ethical leaders ensure that local government remains responsive, accountable, and effective in serving the needs of the public.

How to have your say in Council

All councils in NSW are independent, locally elected corporate bodies responsible for making decisions that have a far-reaching impact on their community. As a resident, your voice plays a crucial role in shaping the policies, projects, and initiatives that impact your local area.

There are a number of ways that you can participate in a council's decision making process. These include: attending council meetings; nominating for a committee; accessing council information; participating in public consultations; and providing feedback.

Residents may also lobby local councillors. Lobbying is common in local government with the most common form occurring when a group or individual makes direct contact with a councillor in an attempt to influence a council decision.

Councillors are lobbied over such issues as: development matters; the upgrading of local facilities, including playgrounds and sporting amenities; and revenue decisions, including the setting of business, mining, farming or special rates.

Moylan warns of 'flow on' effects for NSW under the National Water Agreement

MEMBER for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan delivered a Private Members' Statement in NSW Parliament last night, urging the Minns Labor Government not to sign the National Water Agreement (NWA) which is currently under Commonwealth consultation.

Mr Moylan warned that the NWA should not be agreed to by NSW in its current form and its shortcomings, knowledge gaps, legal and financial ramifications must be addressed.

"For those of us who live in the bush, water is a vital social and economic resource," Mr Moylan said.

"The NWA will replace the 2004 National Water Initiative (NWI) which was the was the result of 10 years of thorough consultation between States and the Commonwealth, and stakeholders. The NWI held Australia in good stead for 20 years.

"In contrast, the Commonwealth Government is attempting to rush the NWA through in a matter of months and bully the States, including NSW into signing it by the end of this year.

"The NWA is complex and will introduce significant changes that weaken secure, sustainable, and productive water use in NSW.

"NSW is also likely to end up shouldering an increased resource and financial burden to deliver the Commonwealth's Wishlist, a cost that will be passed onto water users and regional communities under the current NSW rural pricing model.

"The NWA has being rushed which has resulted in water users the NSW Government insufficient time to fully comprehend the proposed changes and their potential impacts on consumptive water users and regional communities.

"Long standing and well respected National and State representatives of rural water users were excluded from Commonwealth advisory bodies developing the NWA principles, despite their members being the most affected by the outcomes.

"I am urging the State Government to protect the interests of our regional communities and NSW water users, the State Government must advocate for a more balanced, consultative process.

"Further rounds of consultation are necessary to refine the NWA, ensuring that it promotes sustainable water management and protects the interests of all stakeholders, including irrigators in the Northern Tablelands and right across NSW."



Letter to the Editor

Australia's present housing and rental market represents the worst accommodation crisis Australia has faced. So what origins led us to the side effects of (a) inequity (b) restructuring of society due to loss of confidence and lowered expectations of getting ahead (c) loss of status and prestige exemplified by wholesale poverty?

What triggered the extent of homelessness, handouts and couples with jobs and kids sleeping in cars? How did we arrive at such a parlous state where cost of living pressures trashed lifestyles and subjected some of the once comfortable middle aged and others to poverty?

Younger Australians blame the greed and influence of Baby Boomers and the political imperative to keep that voting block on side.

For decades housing construction was a principal economic generator upon which the economy relied. In any healthy marketplace, a fair balance depends upon an equilibrium between supply and demand. It is a heady mix with location, interest rates, economic trends and political decisions largely dictating fluctuating real estate prices. With a housing shortage, rising prices were inevitable but the prolonged retention of negative gearing and tax breaks added momentum to prices in capital cities. These policies outlived their usefulness and became incremental in "the unintended consequences" that politicians often warn us about in hastily enacted legislation.

Negative gearing and the offsetting of capital gains in an endlessly rising market locked first homebuyers out of the market and made millionaires of ordinary wage earners who invested in multiple dwellings. As values rose out of sync with reality, governments of both persuasions subsidised the out-competed first home buyers. Recently the Productivity Commission declared income derived from passive investment does not add to productivity. In hindsight, the desperation measures to encourage first homebuyers to purchase the 'Great Australian Dream' amounted to entrapment.

Make no mistake the Labor and Coalition parties caused and own a housing and rental crisis exacerbated by inflation. The coalition's policy to contain wages for a decade sowed the seeds of an inevitable disparity between wages, housing and rental affordability. Recently Federal Treasurer Jim Chambers blamed "high interest rates" for the borrowers' pain as they try to meet repayments. Historically, interest rates are not high other than in the context of trying to meet repayments on unaffordable housing. Over a lifetime, interest rates around six percent seemed a fair balance. Investors earned income on

savings and purchasers managed their commitments. To put today's capital city housing and rentals prices into perspective, by comparison, a family car would cost something like \$200,000 to \$250,000.

The Federal Government says the path to affordable housing is to build more homes. This purported solution has been well studied and analysed by industry experts who point out housing contractors are experiencing record bankruptcies and relief could be some decades away. At this moment, people don't have that luxury.

Neither do measures that would substantially reduce real estate values offer a solution. Great care must be taken to ensure that falling house prices do not cause debt to exceed asset value. Such an outcome would bring about a catastrophic bloodbath. However, the first priority must be to stop capital city prices from escalating further.

Labor and the Coalition own this housing and rental crisis and all that flows from it. The coming election is foremost in the parties' minds as they jockey for the ascendancy. What we have witnessed is Dutton and his party who has form, intimidating the Labor Party on the housing. Labor avoids potentially beneficial policies out of fear they could be misrepresented in the coming election. Statesmen are needed to put country first and the party after that. Labor and the Coalition must take joint ownership and responsibility for the housing and rental crisis and work together to fix it. Joint ownership, no point scoring or level of intimidation as witnessed. Then, and only then, will voters receive the sort of representation that we so crave. As things stand, there is nothing to indicate our politicians can put aside their philosophical differences to break the cycle. In the meantime, the rich get richer and the growing poor more vulnerable due to loss of control over their destiny.

No penalties for kids over social media age limit

Social media companies will bear the responsibility to block childrens' access to their platforms as the communications minister mulls an appropriate age limit.

Michelle Rowland is reviewing a minimum age of between 14 and 16 years to access social media, with legislation to be introduced before the end of November.

There won't be penalties for children or parents.

"Instead, it will be incumbent on the platforms to demonstrate they are taking reasonable steps to ensure fundamental protections are in place," an excerpt of the minister's planned speech to a social media summit on Friday reads.

Exemptions for social media platforms that demonstrate a low risk of harm to children are being considered.

"The aim is to create positive incentives for digital platforms to develop age-appropriate versions of their apps," Ms Rowland is expected to say.

"We are conscious of the harmful features in the design of platforms that drive addictive behaviours.

"This is why we will set parameters to guide platforms in designing social media that allows connections, but not harms, to flourish."

She pointed to Meta introducing account restrictions for young people on Instagram.

"So the platforms have the capacity to do more and they should be doing more," she told ABC TV ahead of her speech.

A trial of age verification technology has shown technology giants can enforce age limits, she said.

There will be a 12-month timeframe for the industry to adapt to any laws and changes brought in by the federal government.

The NSW and South Australian governments are convening a two-day social media summit that started on Thursday.

Life-Saving Defibrillators Available for NSW Sports Facilities

NSW sporting clubs and organisations have the opportunity to apply for their share of \$500,000 in funding from the NSW Government for new lifesaving defibrillators.

The equipment is funded under the NSW Government's Local Sport Defibrillator Grant Program which provides up to \$3,000 to eligible sporting organisations for the purchase of automated external defibrillators at sports facilities.

Since the Program commenced, more than 2,000 defibrillators have been installed at sports facilities across NSW.

Applications close 27 November 2024 or when funding is

exhausted.

Minister for Sport Steve Kamper said:

"With more than 9,000 out of out-of-hospital cardiac arrest in NSW each year, the first few minutes following an incident are critical, and access to a defibrillator can mean the difference between life and death.

"The NSW Government wants to ensure people participating in sport have access to this life-saving equipment.

"The Local Sport Defibrillator Program ensures clubs are equipped to respond to these life-threatening emergencies."

Scholarships support local health students

Two local health students will receive a \$10,000 boost to their university studies over the next two years as the winners of the Dr William Hunter and Healthy Communities scholarships.

Madelyn Johnson, a second year student in a Doctor of Medicine at Charles Sturt University was awarded the Barwon Health Alliance Dr William K Hunter Scholarship.

"It's a real privilege to get this recognition, a real privilege to be from Moree, and I love the community," she said.

Over the past 20 years, the scholarship has supported 37 students from Bingara, Warialda, Moree and Collarenebri in their pursuit of a variety of health careers including medicine, physiotherapy, speech therapy, psychology, dentistry and biomedical science.

Madelyn acknowledged the impact scholarship namesake Dr Hunter had on the local community during his career as a GP and surgeon, and hoped she would be able to follow in his footsteps.

Dr Hunter described Madelyn as a "trailblazer", as a Moree local and Aboriginal woman studying medicine.

In her second year of a Bachelor of Nursing at the University of New England, Morgan O'Dempsey was delighted to receive the Gwydir Valley Cotton Industry's Healthy Communities scholarship.

"This is amazing. Thank you!" she said.

Supporting second year medical, allied health and nursing students from the Warialda, Bingara, Moree and Collarenebri districts; the Dr William K Hunter and Healthy Communities scholarships provide two years of funds to assist with accommodation, textbooks and other university costs.

"All rural areas have shortages of health professionals in all categories," Dr William Hunter said. He estimated that around 60 NSW towns were without doctors, and very few had obstetric services.



"Graduates from rural towns are more likely to return there than city compatriots. We also know that students in rural towns have to contend with higher transport and accommodation costs to attend the city-based courses," he said.

"These scholarships are to help alleviate these costs as well as encourage local students to have a go."

First established in 2004, the Dr Hunter scholarship is now an initiative of local non-profit HealthWISE as part of their Barwon Health Alliance program, which aims to enhance educational opportunities for current and future primary health care workers in the Barwon region.

The Healthy Communities scholarship is one of a number of medical scholarships the Gwydir Cotton Growers Association (CGA) has funded over the past 25 years. Gwydir CGA committee member Liam Winter said the two scholarships shared the common goal of supporting local medical students and creating a stronger, more viable health sector.



TAFE NSW Supports Aboriginal Trainee's Quest for Rural Healthcare Equity

TAFE NSW is transforming rural and Aboriginal healthcare by addressing skill needs and training future professionals like Jasmin Briggs, a 17-year-old Gamilaroi woman from Warialda, northwest NSW.

Over seven million rural Australians¹, face limited healthcare access, with Aboriginal people experiencing a 6.8-year life expectancy gap.

Health professionals and services that honour Aboriginal cultural identity are crucial for improving treatment participation².

Ms Briggs, completing her Certificate III in Health Services Assistance, is on track to becoming a health professional ready to address skill shortages and enhance healthcare in rural NSW.

Motivated by personal loss and witnessing local healthcare disparities, Ms Briggs decided to pursue a career in advancing healthcare equity in Aboriginal communities.

"Growing up, my community had only one medical clinic, with the nearest alternative an hour's drive away," Ms Briggs said.

"TAFE NSW has ignited my healthcare journey, and inspired me to strive towards becoming a doctor, ensuring Aboriginal people in my community receive the healthcare they deserve."

Ms Briggs has already achieved significant recognition, including being a Finalist in the 2024 New England Training Awards for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Student of the Year and a winner of the Zonta 2024 Achievement Award for Young Indigenous Women (AAYIW).

Alongside her high achievements and career drive, TAFE NSW has helped Ms. Briggs start her career in health and work towards her dream by equipping her with real-world experience and practical skills.

Thanks to her education at TAFE NSW, Ms. Briggs qualifies for the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Scholarship at the University of New England and will join their Country Doctor Program to realise her dream of working in her community.

Martin Bower, Ms Briggs' teacher and Career Advisor at Warialda High School said it was clear early on that




Lions International



74% as at 16 October 2024











22nd Ride for the Chopper




