Moylan to Introduce Private Members Bill for Youth Crime

Reform

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan gave notice in Parliament today of the introduction of the 'Regional Youth Crime Reform Bill'.

Mr Moylan intends to read the Bill either next week or in the March NSW Parliament sittings.

The Bill seeks to make three straightforward, yet significant changes, to address the ongoing youth crime problems in regional NSW.

The three proposed changes include:

- 1. Reversal of *doli incapax*.
- To remove the loophole in section 22 of the Bail Act so courts, including the Supreme Court, are not permitted to grant bail to serious juvenile repeat offenders.
- 3. To require courts to place greater weight on the impact on the victim when sentencing an offender.

In the last two years, there has been an increase in serious crime, particularly violent break-ins, across the Northern Tablelands.



Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan intends to introduce the 'Regional Youth Crime Reform Bill' to NSW Parliament.

The purpose of this Bill is to protect the community.

Last year, \$13.4 million was pledged by the NSW Government to Moree to implement programs to prevent youth crime and another \$2 million was promised last Friday.

This week, \$4 million was allocated to Bourke and Kempsey for the same problem.

Mr Moylan acknowledges the importance of diversionary programs but believes serious repeat offenders should be held accountable.

"We must hold offenders accountable for the harm they cause innocent victims and the broader community," he said.

"While diversionary programs are important, the community needs the laws to change so they are protected, and offenders are dealt with properly and not released without proper consequences.

"Continually throwing money at this problem won't change it.

"We can't keep doing the same thing and hoping for a different outcome.

"We need serious legislative change and this bill is the start of the process. I was hoping the Government would introduce their own Bill, they haven't done anything so I will."

Mayoral Column

I hope all readers enjoyed a safe and happy festive season. On behalf of my fellow Councillors, I would like to wish all the Gwydir Shire residents and ratepayers the very best for 2025.

Throughout the month of January, Council's Technical Services team worked on several road projects within the Shire including:

- Contracted work for Transport for NSW on State Highways within the local government area.
- Continued construction of Country Boundary Road in the north of the Shire which is funded by the 'Roads of Strategic Importance' initiative.
- Commenced construction of the last 2 kms of IB Bore Road as a contractor to Moree Plains Shire Council.

On Wednesday 5 February 2025, Alex Eddy, a Director of Council, and I together with the Mayor of Dubbo Shire Council made a presentation to the NSW Upper House regarding PFAS contamination. Alex and I spoke of the recent Warialda water supply contamination. If you would like to view this presentation it is available on the NSW Parliament YouTube Channel.

Last week Council staff and I met with the Minister for Water, Rose Jackson. At the meeting we sought financial assistance with the construction of a new bore for the Warialda water supply and a fast-tracked Approval. This meeting was very successful with the Minister indicating strong support for the establishment of an additional bore. When Council receives more information, we will inform the community.

Please note that a site for a new bore has been identified. The proposed site is well upstream from the contaminated bores and is adjacent to a private bore. This bore has been tested and the results showed no measurable traces of PFAS.

On Friday 14 February 2025, Council staff and I attended a Border Regional Organisation of Councils (BROC) meeting at The Living Classroom, Bingara. BROC meetings are held quarterly every year to discuss, and deal with issues which are faced by rural and remote communities either side of the NSW/Oueensland border.

I have been in touch with Barnaby Joyce's Office and have discussed with them the poor level of Telstra services. Council foresees this to be an ongoing conversation and we hope to be involved with the push to improve coverage for our community. We need to be able to connect with one another effectively. This issue will be discussed at our next Council meeting.

There was no Council meeting for the month of January, as this is traditionally a time of recess. The next Council meeting will be held on Thursday 20 February 2025 at The Living Classroom, Bingara.

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all the nominees and recipients of the Australia Day Award ceremonies that were conducted across the Shire. It is wonderful to see the efforts of our community members being recognised for all their great work.

In other exciting news, it is fantastic that the Atep family have now secured a permanent visa, allowing them to stay within the Gwydir Shire. I recognise the Atep family have long been a part of the Bingara community, however I would like to officially welcome them to the Gwydir community. I acknowledge the efforts of local residents in the push for the Atep family to stay in Australia, your support with this initiative was extremely impactful on the final outcome.

Connecting With Council on Social Media

Have you ever wondered how your friend knows about a Facebook post?

Do you ever feel that you don't receive Facebook posts that you want to read? For example, you may want to find out when an event is happening. Or you may want to inform yourself about a community issue.

Many Facebook users find it frustrating that their page seems to be filled with advertisements and that there are just so many posts which don't really interest or affect them.

Gwydir Shire seeks to connect with residents and visitors through many mediums including Facebook. When staff upload posts some of these posts reach a very small number of people only, while other posts reach thousands of people.


Facebook connections are embedded in complicated software algorithms but together we can bypass these and connect in a much easier way and more often.

Please consider taking the following steps so that Council can connect with you in a more effective and timely manner through Facebook.

Instead of waiting to see what falls onto your page, go to the top left-hand corner of your Facebook page and click on the magnifying glass icon (see image below) and type in

Gwydir Shire Council

and then click on the page link.



The page will then open and you see what has been posted by Council staff for you to read.

Going forward when you again wish to read what has been posted you just repeat the same steps.

That is, you go to the magnifying glass icon on the top left-hand side of your page and start typing the name of the Facebook page you would like to see. As you type you will see the page's name generate. Simply then click on this name and the page will open.

You can do this for Council's other Facebook pages as well. These pages are entitled Warialda, Place of Wild Honey and Bingara, NSW.

Using these steps, you bypass seeing only what Facebook places on your page feed. Instead you can directly connect with the Facebook page you seek.

If you need a bit more help or assistance you can ask one of our staff in our libraries.

Try it, you may like it.

Bingara Riverside Project

During the month of November 2024, the Soil Conservation Service advised that they could not undertake the project over the Summer period due to the heightened river levels caused by water releases from Copeton Dam. However, the new project officer oversaw temporary works which included the protection of the riverbank and river gum.

The actual project will commence now in March 2025 under the stewardship of this new project officer. Council now has confidence that this project will be completed by end July 2025 and that the foreshore will again be a showcase for the Bingara township.

The Living Classroom (TLC)

TLC continues to be a busy place. New all-access footpaths are being constructed, works on the Interpretive Centre are progressing well. TLC has many bookings with the Classroom and Bunkhouse being used frequently.

The electricity low voltage supply, water and sewage have been connected to the new cabins. Unfortunately though, Council is still awaiting the necessary electricity high voltage supply to be installed. Council has been advised that this supply will be installed mid-March 2025.





Bingara Administration Centre Update

The Bingara Administration Centre project is progressing with trades returning to site after the Christmas/ New Year break.

The following work is in progress:

Image 1

The roof of the existing façade has been moved and other sections have been stripped out in preparation for the supporting structural steel work to be added. Sections of the existing brick façade to be removed are yet to be demolished.

Image 2

Underfloor sanitary drainage has now been completed.

Image 3

Strip footings to the southern section of the building (adjacent to the Pally Styles building) have been excavated with reinforcing steelwork installed. Block layers have commenced laying of the concrete blocks to form the fire wall adjacent to Pally Styles.

Council will be removing the granite material which has been excavated from the building strip footings and stockpiled on site. It is good clean material so Council will stockpile it at the sewer treatment plant site for reuse on other projects.

Draft Plan of Management - Community Land Gwydir LGA

The draft Plan of Management (PoM) for Community Land - Gwydir Local Government Area (LGA) is on public exhibition commencing from 9am, Thursday 20 February 2025 to 5pm, Thursday 20 March 2025.

A PoM is a requirement under the Local Government Act 1993 and Crown Land Management Act 2016 for all public land classified as community land. It provides strategic planning and governance for the ongoing management and use of the land.

Members of the community are invited to review the plan and to lodge submissions with Council for consideration.

You may view an electronic copy of the draft Community Land PoM via Council's website and printed copies will also be made available at any of Council's Administration Services Centres and Libraries.

Council officers will be available to discuss the draft Community Land - Gwydir Local Government Area PoM between 11am and 12.30pm on Tuesday 18 March 2025 at the Bingara Customer Service Centre, 74 Maitland Street, Bingara.

Return to Parliament

Parliament returned for the first sitting fortnight of 2025 last week. It was a bittersweet week for me, marked by the reality that it was my last 'first week' back in Canberra.

Speculation on when the election will be called was rife within the walls of Parliament House, but it was still business as usual for me with plenty of meetings, debates and events to partake in.

It is clear that the Labor Government has realised, on the slim chance that they do win the election, they'll have nothing to do because they have spent their entire term in government happily announcing and opening projects which were funded by the previous Coalition Government. I suggested to the House that they could maybe have a sod-filling ceremony for the section of Inland Rail that they stalled; they could also have a game of cricket on the parched cotton fields where water has been diverted to win South Australian Senate votes; or perhaps they could even try beating a road train across the Newell Highway where funding was cut for the \$44 million overpass at Moree. These suggestions were unfortunately laughed off by those in Government, because they are only interested in opportunities which make themselves look good. The truth is Labor only cares about making promises and then fails to deliver.

On Wednesday I also took the opportunity to speak in the Federation Chamber on the closure of Wee Waa Hospital. The community of Wee Waa have been very angry and upset by the decision, and despite reassurances from the Independent State Member and the New South Wales Health Minister, there appears to be no action by Hunter New England Health. It's time for the leadership of Hunter New England Health to get their skates on, get in the car and come to Wee Waa to find a solution. Basic health care is something that all Australians should have access to, and I'm backing the people of Wee Waa on this.

Free student broadband extended

With many across the electorate already back in school or about to start school this week, now is a great time to remind families of the **School Student Broadband Initiative (SSBI)**.



Through this initiative the Australian Government aims to bridge the digital divide and expand educational opportunities for students who do not have home internet access.

I am pleased to see SSBI has been extended, now offering free home internet to eligible families until 30 June 2028.

To qualify, participants must:

- Have a child living at home that is enrolled in an Australian school;
- Not have an active NBN network internet service at home or in the past 14 days (having a mobile internet service does not affect eligibility); and,
- Live in a premises that can access the NBN network.

This extension is available to all eligible families, whether they are existing participants of SSBI or new to the program.

New Electorate Office in Inverell Open for Business

A new satellite electorate office is open in Inverell.

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan has unveiled a new electorate office in Inverell to provide a central place for the community to raise state government matters.

From 11 February, the office will be open on Tuesdays and Fridays at the Inverell Shire Council building at 114 Otho Street.

"NSW Parliament allows larger electorates, like ours, to have part-time satellite offices as long as they are in existing government buildings," Mr Moylan said.

"It is great to be able to open an office in Inverell for two days per week."

"Inverell is the centre point of the Northern Tablelands so it will benefit people within the community who cannot get to Armidale or Moree."

Although the Inverell satellite electorate office will only be staffed on Tuesdays and Fridays, a correspondence box will be available for drop-offs during business hours (8.30am until 4.30pm) on all other days.

The electorate office can help with public health and public hospitals, education, land and water management, police, transport, public housing, main roads, public works, emergency services, national parks, community services, NSW industrial relations, fair trading, primary industries, and family and communities.

Australian Hearing Aid Industry at Crossroads

In Australia one in six people are considered affected by hearing loss while one in five could actually benefit from wearing hearing aids. The Federal Department of Health and Aged Care finances a Hearing Aid Program that fully or partially subsidises the supply of hearing aids. In those instances where extra features are sought the client pays the additional cost.

The hearing aid industry professes to service clients with a "mild to moderate hearing loss" but what about those severely handicapped? An honest audiologist classified a 100 decibels hearing loss as "profound" and on ethical grounds declined to fit a hearing aid to the client. This level of loss brings cochlear implants into contention.

Hearing assessments normally comprise a number of tests and reputable outlets provide a graph of hearing loss. Unfortunately some clients do not receive the graph to which they are entitled. Without truly knowing their real circumstances the seller's recommendations often fall short of meeting their expectations. Those with severe hearing loss frequently become disillusioned about the performance of their hearing aids and ambivalent about wearing them.

There is a need to properly consider the limitations of hearing aids. All devices are miniscule and because of wearer sensitivity, invisible ones are in demand. Because of their tiny size and limited decibel output they lack the necessary grunt to combat severe hearing loss. In the absence of a visible cable linked to a portable power pack – increasing the volume would be the equivalent of pushing a modest stereo amplifier beyond its best reproductive capacity. As all hearing impaired people quickly come to realise, to hear is one thing, to comprehend, another.

A *Google* search on personal amplifiers provides a negative impression and warns of associated risks. Yet for around \$400 to \$500 the best have merit and can compensate for profound hearing loss. They are not as discreet as hearing aids but small personal amplifiers are portable and come with ear buds and/or light headphones. The personal amplifier normalises car conversations and a cable to the TV gives individual control over fluctuating volume while assisting comprehension and clarity. For the severely handicapped, personal amplifiers appear underutilised.

In 2017, America revolutionised the marketing of hearing aids by dispensing with mandatory assessments and endorsing over the counter sales. However, it was not until October 2022 that the law took effect. *Walmart* reputedly sells some basic units for \$200. As a consequence of these structural changes, heavily discounted used hearing



aids have found their way on to the Australian market through *Ebay*. The Australian industry appears to have taken a protective stance to preserve its expensive marketing structure by declining to service compatible discounted international brands purchased overseas.

A world-wide examination of the hearing industry indicates that behind the scenes there is resignation the available technology cannot meet all the desired objectives. New technological innovations must be developed if the industry is to gain widespread approval and win endorsement from that portion of the affected community.

The Gwydir River. What it was, is, and could be.

The scenic Gwydir River is one of the most popular river camping spots with caravaners and mobile home owners in all of NSW. On a daily basis Bingara residents witness the presence of caravans and mobile homes as an endless stream of retirees tour Australia. Made welcome, their stopover presence is a fillip to the local economy.

Copeton Dam, a very large and deep dam, was built in the 1970's as an irrigation source for Americans who pioneered the cotton industry. Based on an American design, along with many other NSW dams, it shares a common flaw—cold water pollution.

Long term Bingara locals say prior to the dam, the untamed river had deep holes up to six metres deep with water so clear you could see the bottom. Naturally unspoilt, it was then a haven for murray cod, yellow-belly, catfish, platypus, shrimps and all small river biota that underpinned the river ecology.

Below, at the end of Maitland Street, locals water skied. As in all other instances, river capture by dams changes the natural flow and introduces a more restrictive regime that inevitably results in the rivers silting up. Where once, devotees water skied, horses now cross the river knee deep. Silting could have serious implications. In the unlikely event the dam fills and copious rainfall continues Copeton would no longer inhibit flooding. Water that once ran deeper must then flood wider.

Water in the dam stratifies and "dead" water from the bottom—released as cold water depletion—nullifies the effective breeding of the iconic Murray Cod and other desirable species. With an absence of small fish and biota on which to feed, progeny have a poor start while running the gauntlet with carp that infest the river. As indicated by their more copious infestation hundreds of kilometres downstream, carp obviously do not relish the cold water pollution either.

Some years ago when cold water

depletion was put on the agenda with the Murray Darling Basin Association agricultural interests and Indigenous representatives were supportive of finding and implementing a solution as it presented problems for them too. Local State representative Adam Marshall was very supportive, presenting an online petition and making numerous representations to the respective minister. A delegation met with federal representative Barnaby Joyce who conceded the problem and mentioned "morning glory" as a likely solution. It is understood morning glory is an adjustable device that skims viable water from the surface. Gwydir Shire Council, at best, were only luke warm. However nothing has ever been done and the insidious problem remains. In the absence of agitation, political interest appears even colder than the water

So, what benefits would a solution to cold water pollution bring? Well, firstly there is an obligation once a problem is identified to deal with and rectify it. As a society we are mere custodians of our environment and the dependent species that in this case, once inhabited it. That we have an appalling record of degradation and species loss is to be ashamed of. As a wealthy, apathetic society we have the means of doing better, but where do we find the motivation?

What would it take to rectify cold water pollution in the Gwydir River and somewhat restore the river to its former glory? Sometimes, such remedies can occur on the back of the endless toil of committed individuals. In real terms there is one obvious way to move governments and get results. Wholesale community participation. It starts with Council, political representatives and organisations. Not just lip service but genuine grass roots involvement, passion and insistence. Various studies have been done and rectifying cold water pollution would be a cost benefit.

In the News Work to Begin to Deliver Fire Control Centres

The NSW Government is investing \$21 million in the safety of Northern NSW communities with the development of two new bush fire and emergency management centres in the region.

The NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) has awarded construction contracts for the development of the new Clarence Valley and Namoi Gwydir Fire Control and Emergency Operations Centres.

Hines Construction Pty Ltd will soon begin building both facilities following a competitive tender process, with the projects to be managed by NSW Public Works.

The Clarence Valley centre, currently in Ulmarra, will relocate next to Grafton Airport, providing better access to aerial firefighting resources during bush fires and other emergencies.

The new Namoi Gwydir facility will be built on a larger site opposite the existing Control Centre in Narrabri. It will include a new station for the Narrabri Headquarters Brigade and a helipad.

Both centres will feature state-of-the-art operational workspaces, training rooms and storage facilities, better supporting the needs of local volunteer firefighters.

The centres will provide local emergency services with the cutting-edge technology and resources they need to effectively manage a multi-agency response to hazards, including storms and floods.

The new facilities are being developed in response to the 2020 NSW Bushfire Inquiry, which identified the need for upgraded emergency management infrastructure in the region.

Minister for Emergency Services, Jihad Dib said:

Regional airline Link Air has made the decision to suspend flights from March 1st between Inverell, Narrabri, and Sydney due to reduced demand.

In an update, the airline says despite the suspension, they will continue to monitor the market closely and look to return to Sydney when demand recovers.

Flights will continue to operate between Narrabri, Inverell and Brisbane and will increase to operate four days a week.

Customers on affected Sydney flights will be contacted and offered a full refund or a re-booking on alternative flights to Brisbane adding they would like to thank the Inverell and Narrabri communities, and Councils, for their ongoing support since Link Airways commenced flights at both locations in 2017.

Inverell Shire Mayor Kate Dight assured residents that Council shares in the community's disappointment regarding Link Airways decision.

In a statement, Council says they've strongly supported Link Airways, including waiving landing fees to assist in maintaining this service but despite this setback, Council will continue to work closely with Link Airways and any other interested operators to explore viable options for reestablishing commercial passenger flights to Sydney in the future.

Bringing Health Professionals
Back to the Bush

Bringing health professionals back to the bush, HealthWISE and Gwydir Cotton Growers Association (CGA) have awarded three Moree and Gwydir students with \$22,000 to support their university studies.

For two decades, the Dr William Hunter scholarship and a variety of Gwydir CGA scholarships have helped health students complete their studies, with the shared goal of building the local health sector.

"There are no words to describe how much of a difference this scholarship has made and the opportunities it has given me," Dr William Hunter scholarship winner Kristen Rogers said. After a year of health struggles, she said the funds made it possible for her to commit to full-time study.

"We were impressed by her love of nursing and her dedication to her vocation as well as her community," scholarship namesake Dr Hunter said.

An assistant in nursing at the Bingara Multi-Purpose Service for the past eight years, Kristen is working towards becoming a registered nurse, studying a Bachelor of Nursing at the University of New England. Dr Hunter encouraged Kristen's ambitions, and said the Moree health service relies on several registered nurses who first trained as assistants.

"I am beyond excited to bring more registered nurses to these beautiful country towns. I really hope I can make you all proud," Kristen said.

The first person in her family to attend university, Moree local Mikala Bearman was awarded a \$2,000 Dr William Hunter encouragement scholarship. Mikala is passionate about rural mental health care, and can see herself working in schools with Indigenous students. She is completing a Bachelor of Counselling at Southern Cross University while working as Campus Coordinator at Community College Northern Inland's Moree Campus.

"Going into such a rewarding and fulfilling career can allow

me to help people in rural and remote areas," she said. Mikala also hopes her experience will inspire other rural people to consider university and recognise that there is more than one path to higher education.

Gwydir CGA Healthy Communities winner James Nolan shared his story growing up in Moree, dealing with long waits and expensive travel to ensure his sister had the care she needed for cystic fibrosis.

"I have firsthand knowledge of the difficulties facing families in rural and remote communities, and I want to bring some of those health services to those in need in country areas," he said.

James is studying a Bachelor of Occupational Therapy at Southern Cross University, and hopes to one day open a mobile practice in the Moree region, specialising in neurodiverse paediatrics. Gwydir CGA committee member

Liam Winter said the interview panel was impressed by James' end goals and commitment to his community.

"My aim is to service a broad area, helping regional and remote children achieve the best that they can, especially in their important earlier years of life," James said.

"HealthWISE is honoured to be supporting the Dr William Hunter scholarship and the Gwydir Valley Cotton Industries Healthy Communities scholarship, and thereby strengthening community capacity for improved health and wellbeing," HealthWISE Barwon Health Alliance program manager Susanne Kable said.



In the film, Pitt and Thewlis are mountaineering in 1930s India. When World War II begins in 1939, their German citizenship results in their imprisonment in a British prisoner-of-war camp in the Himalayas. In 1944, they escape the prison and cross the border into Tibet. There, after initially being ordered to return to India, they are welcomed at the holy city of Lhasa and become absorbed into an unfamiliar way of life. Pitt is introduced to the 14th Dalai Lama, still a boy, and becomes one of his tutors.

This is a well-made historical movie. It depicts a turbulent period in the history of Tibet which is not so known because of China's aggressive intervention and secretive policies. The scenes of mountaineering are an amazing addition to the whole episode and the transformation of the Austrian mountaineer and SS officer is astonishing.






