From the Mayor

April is proving to be another busy month across our Shire. It has been wonderful to see such beautiful rain to green things up and fill dams coming into winter.

Roads

At the time of writing this there has been a lot of road damage throughout the Gwydir Shire due to the recent rain events which caused roads to be closed and road works to be delayed.

During March, maintenance grading/re-sheeting was carried out on the following roads:

- Currangandi Road

- Elcombe Road
- · Warialda Road.

Council's General Manager, Max Eastcott, Deputy General Manager, Leeah Daley, and Engineering Director, Alex Eddy and I met with the Mayor of Moree Plains Shire Council, Susannah Pearse, Acting General Manager, Natalia Cowley, Councillor Peter Mailer and Engineering Director, John Dyer to discuss roads in our Shires and how we do things. As I mentioned in my last month's Column Gwydir is undertaking some road work within Moree Plains Shire Council as a contractor. This close co-operation is such a positive for all of our residents.

Telstra Services

In previous columns I have written about the poor Telstra service in our Shire and Council's meeting with The Hon Barnaby Joyce MP. Following this meeting Mr Joyce made a speech to the Federal Parliament House of Representatives on 27 March 2025. Below are two extracts from his speech.

'As a regional member of parliament, some of the biggest things you can do are to get people a mobile phone tower. It's not that they want to do share transactions; they just want to know at Upper Horton that, if someone comes off a horse at the campdraft when it's on—and you've got 1,000 people or so there—and the person is suspected to have broken their neck, you can make the call straight away. People in regional areas have a right to be looked after'.

'When we go back to them [Telstra], we'll say, 'Hang on, these people got 3G, and you promised they would get 4G and 5G, but now they're getting "no G". They have no G at all'

Hopefully something will change, and services improve soon. Please sign the community petition if you haven't had a chance yet.

Meeting with Essential Energy

Council's Executive and I had an online meeting with Essential Energy staff to discuss issues which included getting electricity supply connected to The Living Classroom cabins, activating our electric car charging stations and how the electricity supply will be set up to the new administrative building.

Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee (ARIC) Conference - Gilgandra

In the first week of April, Council's Chief Financial Officer, Helen Thomas and I attended an ARIC conference in Gilgandra. At the conference we heard presentations on best practice, internal and external auditing, corruption and fraud and an address by NSW Auditor General, Bolac Oyetunji. The conference was very valuable.

Bingara Show

On Saturday 22 March and Sunday 23 March 2025, Bingara had their Annual Show. It was an honour to open the Show together with the Bingara 2025 Citizen of the Year Mr Daryl Burling and The Hon Brendan Moylan MP.

This year's Show was a great success with a large increase in attendees. The bigger crowds created such a great atmosphere across the whole weekend.

Unfortunately, the rain on Friday night meant that the Campdraft had to be postponed, however all other sections across the Show were well supported.



The Councillors and I would like to acknowledge Charlie Mill and his amazing Committee for their hard work and tireless efforts in bringing the Bingara Show to fruition. The support of volunteers at events like these are so important and they secure the future prosperity of not only the event, but of the community, by bringing visitors to the area. In turn these visitors support and grow our local businesses.

Additionally, the Bingara Show would not have been possible without generous community sponsorship and its event partner, the Bingara RSL Club.

Bingara Administration Building

The Bingara Administration Centre project is progressing well, although recent rain delayed the progress by 2-3 weeks. The contractor for this project, is confident that they can pick up this lost time and still complete the project in September.

It is very exciting to see walls starting to go up.





Orange Festival

The Bingara Special Events Committee has been meeting regularly to organise the 2025 Orange Festival and in exciting news, Hugh Whitfeld - 7 National News Desk Director and Foreign Editor is returning to his hometown for both the Orange Picking and Orange Festival commemorations. When I spoke with Hugh we were talking about his recollections of these events as a child and this is what he had to say.

"Some of my earliest memories are sitting on a plastic bag on Finch Street on the morning of Orange Picking, waiting for the ceremony to end so we could fill the plastic bags with oranges. It's incredible to see how the tradition recognising the service of men and women from Bingara, has evolved to include a festival on Saturday that celebrates our great town. I've always been proud to say where I come from and can't wait to get back to Bingara."

PFAS

Testing for PFAS was undertaken again in March and results show all Council bores and reservoirs were clear except for the Hospital Park bore. The application for a new test bore has been approved by the Department of Climate Change, Energy, Environment and Water (DCCEEW).

A contract driller has been engaged, and the test bore should be drilled before the end of April, weather permitting. The general location of the test bore will be in the vicinity of the truck wash, the exact location is yet to be confirmed.

The NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) is supporting Council to try and locate the source of PFAS in the Warialda water supply. Earlier this month, Council staff collaborated with the EPA to provide information to the Warialda community regarding testing of private bores. The residents and ratepayers of Warialda were offered free bore water testing. Seventeen registrations were received. Thank you so much to those who participated. Participants can expect to receive their results within the next four weeks.

Council expects to use the information gathered to help identify the source of the PFAS which ended up in the Warialda water supply.

Warialda CBD Park

Works have been ongoing at the Warialda CBD Park with the installation of the new fence. The retaining wall which runs along the boundary fence is complete. The electrical cabling has commenced, as well as the under-boring of the existing concrete in preparation for the installation of the irrigation system.



The old hairdresser/bakery shops have been demolished. No well, nor evidence of one was found.

As the demolition progressed, it became clear that the building foundations were much lower than the existing ground level. The difference in the levels created a sump type effect under the building. This may have caused the moisture infiltration and goes somewhat to explaining why there was a pump under the structure.



Coolatai and Upper Horton Landfills

Council has recently upgraded infrastructure at the Coolatai Landfill. The gates at the facility were locked on Monday 7 April 2025 and residents and ratepayers now enter the site using an access code.

An information session was held at the Wallaroo Hotel on Wednesday 2 April 2025 to inform residents about the changes, demonstrate how to use the lock, and answer queries.

All eligible residents were mailed information about the changes in access requirements to the site however if you have any follow up questions, please contact Council's Environmental Services Department.

These changes follow a similar roll out at the Upper Horton Landfill and consultation with residents.

Planning

The Councillors held a Planning Workshop recently to look at ways the entire process can be made less complicated for residents. Dealing with planning legislation can be quite daunting when all you want to do is put up a carport or build a granny flat.

Please remember that Council has staff who can help you through this process, especially for minor applications.

At the Workshop, Council decided on a range of actions that once approved by the relevant State Department, will improve the approval processes. These proposed actions covered the following areas: Gwydir Shire's Housing Strategy, minor updates to the Gwydir Local Environmental Plan, Community Participation Plan, rural workers' dwellings and some revisions to expand the use of industrial zoned land in Warialda.

Country Mayors' Association Meeting – March 2025

At the last Country Mayors' Association meeting the group resolved to endorse all 17 recommendations of the subject report which was entitled, Ability of local governments to fund infrastructure and services.

The report was prepared by a cross-party Standing Committee on State Development. The Committee undertook the reparation of the report at the request of the Minister for Local Government.

The Terms of Reference were:

That the Standing Committee on State Development inquire into and report on the ability of local governments to fund infrastructure and services, and in particular:

- a. the level of income councils require to adequately meet the needs of their communities
- b. examine if past rate pegs have matched increases in costs borne by local governments
- c. current levels of service delivery and financial sustainability in local government, including the impact of cost shifting on service delivery and financial sustainability, and whether this has changed over time
- d. assess the social and economic impacts of the rate peg in New South Wales for ratepayers, councils, and council staff over the last 20 years and compare with other jurisdictions
- e. compare the rate peg as it currently exists to alternative approaches with regards to the outcomes for ratepayers, councils, and council staff
- f. review the operation of the special rate variation process and its effectiveness in providing the level of income Councils require to adequately meet the needs of their communities
- g. any other related matters.

This Report's recommendations are all extremely sensible and were strongly supported.

subsidy, Priority Wage Subsidy and Hiring Incentive. The total amount claimed for 2023/4 financial year is \$46,409.40 and total subsidies claimed for 2024/5 financial year to date amount to \$52,186.30.

Bingara and Warialda Day Care Service

It has been very heartening to hear such positive feedback from parents and guardians about the new Day Care Services. I have been approached by a couple of mothers who expressed how very happy they are with the care that their children are receiving.

These services have been needed in our community for many years, and it is wonderful that they are finally available. So far Council has received 17 enrolments and with current staffing there is a capacity to accommodate 16 children at each centre.

The hours are as follows (8:00am - 4:00pm)

Week 1

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday – Warialda Thursday, Friday – Bingara

Week Two

Monday, Tuesday – Warialda Wednesday, Thursday, Friday – Bingara

Gwydir Career Start

Gwydir Shire Council currently employs 10 school-based trainees, six trainees, 23 full-time apprentices and two Cadets.

Gwydir Career Start participants represent 16% of Council's full-time equivalent workforce. The Councillors and I find this figure to be incredibly exciting because most Career Start participants are within the younger age bracket. It is great to know that these young people are gaining qualifications here in our own backyard, and that in the years to come they will have the skills to be at the helm of Council.

Training is provided by a number of registered training organisations including TAFE, Australian Training Plus, Community College Northern Inland, International Childcare College, Upskilled and Fusion Training Solutions. It is wonderful to have access to well-renowned and respected training providers.

Council claims the following subsidies for eligible Trainees/ Apprentices: Boosting Apprenticeship Commencements wage subsidy, Completing Apprenticeship Commencements wage

A Fresh Start for Local Government Apprentices, Trainees & Cadets program

The NSW Government has recently launched 'A Fresh Start for Local Government Apprentices, Trainees & Cadets' program in line with its goal to increase the local government workforce and for this sector to employ an additional 1,300 apprentices, trainees and cadets.

\$252.2 million over six years has been committed to directly support local councils to develop sustainable workforces. Round 1 of the program closed in November 2024. Of the nine positions that Gwydir Shire Council applied for, seven have been granted conditional approval.

These positions include Apprentice Mechanic, Apprentice Plant Operator (x 2), Trainee Individual Support, Trainee Early Childhood Educator, Trainee Business Administrator, and Cadet Planner. The Councillors and I are ecstatic with this result, as all these wages will be externally funded and will not come out of Council's budget.

Funding for Permanent Shade Structure at Cranky Rock

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan and Gwydir Shire Council mayor Tiffany Galvin at Cranky Rock Recreation Reserve which will soon be home to a new permanent shade structure thanks to funding from the LSCA program.

A new shade structure at Warialda's Cranky Rock Recreation Reserve will greet visitors later this year with funding secured to renovate the outdated facilities.

Gwydir Shire Council was allocated funding from the NSW Government's Local Small Commitment Allocation program, which provides benefits to local communities through a range of events, services and programs, playground and park upgrades, and more.

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan said the upgraded shade structures will improve visitor comfort, particularly in hot weather.

"Cranky Rock is a popular spot for families, tourists, and locals to visit with plenty of facilities and activities on offer there," he said.

"The Reserve is a great place for bushwalking, picnics, camping, swimming, birdwatching and more.

"Having more shade facilities will make visiting the Reserve a much more comfortable experience.

"Well done to Gwydir Shire Council for identifying the need to upgrade the shade structures and being successful in their application to the LSCA program."

Gwydir Shire Council mayor Tiffany Galvin said bettering the Reserve was a priority and the \$24,000 from the LSCA program for the shade structure certainly helps.

"Many groups meet at Cranky Rock; special interest groups, families, travelling groups," she said.

"When they visit the site, the caretaker puts out temporary gazebos for them to use. With this funding there will be a permanent shaded meeting and gathering spot for them.

"A new shade structure with solar lighting and fans will be used by many who visit the site."

It is anticipated the new shade structure will be completed by the end of October 2025.

Reply to Orange Festival Naming

History of the Orange Festival

I started the orange festival 30 years ago with \$500.00 of my own money.

The Back to Bingara Centenary had been an enormous success. I had been the Secretary/publicity officer for it. From this festival the historical society was formed. I was foundation secretary/publicity.

I approached the council about having a festival for Bingara to show how beautiful Bingara is and to promote tourism. Inverell had the Sapphire Festival and Glen Innes the Rose Festival.

The council asked me what I would name the festival. I said it was obvious The Orange Festival. No other town had a 'living memorial' to the dead and soldiers of both world wars. The children of Bingara respected the avenue and honored the meaning.

Bingara had the largest number of enlistments of any town in NSW—also sadly to number of fatalities. Many of those men were members of the 8th Div/2/18, 2/19 battalions sent to Singapore 1941. A disaster Singapore fell on 14/2/1942. The families of those men live here today.

My father Vin McTaggart, and many of his mates, were killed in action. The others spent three and a half years POW of the Japanese. No one knew of what happened to their loved ones until 1945. Just a telegram stating 'MIA, presumed dead.' No television or Facebook then.

The orange trees were planted in 1960, this year is the 80th anniversary of WW2. ANZAC 110, 65 of the orange trees.

The orange festival started small. I decided to go for and see what happened without the council's approval (different days; not now).

I enlisted the help of Rick Hutton, and Councilor John Wearne, they could visualise what I was about.

A man with three camels arrived in Bingara on the Thursday, before camping on the river. Not letting an opportunity pass, I did a deal with him—\$2.00 a ride and \$1.00 festival.

John and Rick dressed in bedspreads, led the parade, no one told me horses and camels do not mix! The Lighthorse's were bucking, the camels snorting and spitting. The one float threw lollies to the children who scrambled for them!

Afterward Don Whiteman wrote it was a glorious shemozzle.

The next year the council gave me \$1,000; H Fay & Son paid the insurance, and The Orange Festival was born.

For 15 years I ran the festival with the Councils help, Tourism, all clubs, businesses, hotels.

The arts council was formed. I was the president enabling

us to get grants for a cultural or children's activity slippery circus etc. Trudi Drewitt was secretary, Kim Brisset Treasurer and Jenny Mead publicity officer.

The last festival I organised was the Greek Festival to promote the Roxy Project. It was massive. The council asked me if they could take it as an event and I said yes with two conditions. The name would never change and there would always be a military aspect in the parade such as the Lighthorse, Army tank, flag etc.

I asked to stay as the consultant and keep organising the parade with members of council and community support.

We have had many great festivals, Italian, Chinese, Goldrush, Murals, Centenary, Australia remembers foundation, That's Roxy entertainment.

I am 90 this year and a member of the events committee. The name Orange Festival will never change. The committee have kept the festival going when many others have failed.

Bingara, let's make this Orange Festival the best—do a float, decorate a window, dress up a dog, dress up, dress up your children. Fly the flag, decorate a scooter.

There will be a display of past festivals at the library prior to this year's festival. Perhaps, you will see yourself. I know it is a school holiday, please try, there are many prizes.

The car club has been a great supporter of the festival over the years. This year a \$200 prize for the best car/driver dressed in the era of the car.

Dear Editor

Please allow me space to wish the new General Manager all the best in her very important role to guide Gwydir Council back to some sort of workable position. A brief history of the formation of Gwydir Shire between the Yallaroi-Bingara-and part Barraba council areas.

Some 20 odd years ago, Yallaroi had 86 staff at Bingara—21 according to the Bingara General Manager. During the one-year administration period, which was done from Bingara, an additional 54 casual staff were located in Bingara to catch up on a back log of works. On the day of the amalgamation these staff were made permanent, the local government minister Kelly commented at the time. Yallaroi was 'had', 'history'.

Most of the high traffic roads in Yallaroi were sealed including town streets, with a motion in Council to seal Dr Wheatley Drive, plus three kilometres a year leading to Warialda, eg., Mosquito–Oregan roads etc. The one road up north which was sealed recently was considered a B class, and kept in good gravel condition. Bingara however had town streets sealed and not much more.

The new council in it's wisdom agreed to catch Bingara up, firstly sealing the Narrabri road, then to Gravesend. These programs, along with the Roxy Theatre, cost millions over some years.

Meanwhile, the streets of Warialda and roads north to the Queensland border (plus the airstrip at Warialda), are deteriorating fast. That brings us up to March 2025.

The town streets at Warialda and roads north to the border area are a disgrace. Road edges are not mowed, potholes are filled with soup that may last one day up to two weeks depending on the B doubles from up north to Inverell abattoir etc.

I understand the current council has a program to build an administration centre in Bingara. I would suggest Warialda has enough buildings to house enough staff to administer the council, if not the people of the old Yallaroi Council should start a move to withdraw from Gwydir with the understanding there is only enough money to look after one end of the existing council.

1080 Baiting **Program to** Commence in the **Gwydir region**

NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) is conducting a 1080 baiting program in Gwydir River National Park and Gwydir River State Conservation Area from Monday 14th April 2025 to Thursday 1st May 2025.

The program will use meat baits containing 1080 (sodium fluoroacetate) poison for the control of wild dogs and foxes. The baiting program will utilise ground baiting techniques.

The program is designed to minimise predator impacts on wildlife, especially threatened species, and to minimise the impact of wild dogs on neighbouring stock. Signs will be placed at the entry to the baiting location.

Domestic pets are not permitted in NSW National Parks managed lands. Pets and working dogs may be affected (1080 is lethal to cats and dogs).

Pets and working dogs must be restrained or muzzled in the vicinity and must not enter the baiting location. In the event of accidental poisoning seek immediate veterinary assistance.

Local Land Services is inviting ratepayers to have their say on the way community representatives are elected to its local boards.

As part of a review of the election process, Local Land Services is conducting a survey to understand how it can improve the experience for voters.

Open to new and long-time voters, the short, five-minute survey closes on 17 April 2025.

Local Land Services CEO Kate Lorimer-Ward said feedback would inform recommendations to make the election process more engaging and accessible.

"Local boards play a key role in connecting Local Land Services to landholders and communities across NSW," Ms Lorimer-Ward said.

"The election process allows our customers to vote for who represents them on their local board and is critical to ensuring their voice is heard on matters that affect them, so it's important we make it as simple as possible.

"While there was an increase in the number of voters in last year's election, compared to 2020, we recognise there's room to improve engagement with the election process.

"Whether you're a past voter or have never voted before, we want to hear from you about what's working well and where we can make improvements."

Local board elections are run in accordance with the LLS Regulation 2014. The review Local Land Services is undertaking will inform where regulatory and nonregulatory changes may need to be considered to improve customer experience.

In addition to elected board members, each of Local Land Services' 11 local boards has some Ministerially appointed

Together they provide oversight of local strategic planning, performance monitoring and local policy, helping to shape the services Local Land Services delivers.



The chair of each local board sits on the statewide Local Land Services Board, which is responsible for overseeing statewide priorities in line with the State Strategic Plan.

The AEC is urging people who cannot make it to vote inperson, and need to cast a postal vote in the 2025 federal election, to apply early or risk missing out.

Every effort is made for applications lodged late in the election period, including using priority and express mail services, but depending on a voter's circumstances, there may be a chance it is not received in time.

"Australia has some of the best in-person voting options in the world. If a voter can turn up to a voting centre, then that is what they must do. "

A list of early voting centres will be available on the AEC website soon. Early voting starts on Tuesday 22 April.

Each federal election there are around 2-2.5 million postal vote applications received by the AEC – many of those arrive late in the election period. All require local roll verification checks, processing and ballot pack printing prior to delivery.

The AEC is not only urging people needing a postal vote to apply early but also to apply directly through the AEC.

Voters can apply for a postal vote now by visiting https://www.aec.gov.au/pva

Key information:

2,389,751 postal votes were cast at the previous federal election in 2022.

The legislated deadline to apply for a postal vote is 6pm local time on Wednesday 30 April

Any application after Thursday 24 April risks your postal vote pack not arriving in time, depending on your circumstances.

Your postal vote must be completed on or before election day, Saturday 3 May 2025 and returned to the AEC before Friday 16 May 2025, or your vote will not be included in the count.

BreastScreen NSW has relaunched a campaign encouraging women to have a life saving mammogram and join the more than 55,000 women who screened across Hunter New England Local Health District in 2024.

Kairsten Marley, Hunter New England Local Health District BreastScreen NSW Manager, said with almost 900 women in our district expected to be diagnosed with breast cancer this year, now is the time to book a free, life-saving breast screen.

"For women aged 50-74, a breast screen every two years is the best way to detect breast cancer early before it can be seen or felt. The message is clear – put yourself, and your health first and make breast screening a priority," Kairsten said.

First launched in late 2023, the Breast Cancer Doesn't Wait campaign has been refined to reach even more women, now including targeted advertising in local government areas with the highest numbers of underscreened women.

The campaign encourages women to prioritise their twoyearly breast screening, which is the best way to detect breast cancer in its earliest stages. New data from Cancer Institute NSW shows around 3,100 additional cancers would be detected if every eligible woman had a regular mammogram.

Professor Tracey O'Brien AM, NSW Chief Cancer Officer and CEO of the Cancer Institute NSW said the Breast Cancer Doesn't Wait campaign is part of efforts to spread awareness of the life-saving power of a mammogram.

"More than 1,000 women are expected to die in NSW this year from breast cancer and we are determined to support women to detect and treat breast cancer as early as possible," Professor O'Brien said.

"Early detection not only significantly increases a person's chance of survival to 98 per cent, it can also greatly reduce the need for invasive treatment like a mastectomy.
