From Dawn to Dusk: Gwydir Shire Pays Tribute on ANZAC Day



A day of remembrance united towns and villages across the Gwydir region as residents gathered on April 25 to honour the legacy of the ANZACs. From solemn dawn services to proud community marches, the spirit of respect and reflection was felt throughout the Shire.

Bingara Stands in Silence

Leading up to ANZAC Day, members of the Bingara Sub-Branch presented remembrance services at the local hospital and aged care home. Both services were received with great enthusiasm. ANZAC Day commenced with a 6.00am dawn service at the Memorial Garden, followed by a Gunfire Breakfast at the RSL Club. Later, residents assembled at the corner of Cunningham and Maitland Streets for the ANZAC March, culminating in a memorial service at 11.00am.

Warialda Reflects with Pride

Warialda's observances began with a dawn service at Captain Cook Park, followed by a midmorning march along Hope Street. Wreaths were laid at the Memorial Hall, leading into a commemorative service that brought the community together in reflection.

Smaller Communities, Deep Traditions

At Crooble, around 90 people were in attendance. Warialda and Croppa Creek School and St Philomena's School in Moree were represented by the children who live around the Crooble area. Sean Coleman represented the Gwydir Shire and read the requiem, and Mr Jim Wilby travelled from Roma to act as guest speaker. Jim is one of the Vietnam Veterans listed on

From the Mayor

Each month I start by saying another month has passed by quickly but who can believe we are now in May. It is wonderful going into winter with an abundance of feed, full dams and enough moisture in the soil for crops that have been planted.

Mobile Network Coverage

Over the last month, I have driven from one end of the Shire to the other and it is so lovely to see how beautiful the country is looking; however, such travel has reinforced to me the major issue which is the very poor mobile coverage. The Councillors and I find this very troubling in this day and age. We are not worried about the fact that people are not able to scroll through Facebook or download from the internet, our major concern is what happens in a lifethreatening situation and there is no phone service to call it in.

Over Easter, Bingara had no service at all, which greatly affected businesses as their customers could not use Eftpos and the ATMs were down. Sales were dramatically affected on one of the town's busiest weekends.

As you can appreciate, the community and travellers were frustrated. It was also very embarrassing with so many visitors to the town. The Annual Easter Fishing Competition was also majorly impacted.

I have written to the Minister of Communications, The Hon Michelle Rowland and have requested a meeting regarding the lack of phone reception across the Gwydir Shire.

I also reached out to the offices of the Member for New England, The Hon Barnaby Joyce MP and the Member of Northern Tablelands, The Hon Brendan Moylan MP.

I am thankful that both Members made representations on Council's behalf.

As a result of Mr Moylan's representations, Council's Executive and I met with Telstra representatives on Wednesday 7 May. In this meeting Telstra acknowledged that there are issues and have now agreed to work with Council to develop a Connectivity Plan specifically for our local government area. This is a positive commitment, and it is hoped this commitment will lead to improvement and change.

In addition, the Councillors and I intend to provide signed copies of the recent community petition, along with many letters from businesses which express how the lack of Telstra services affects them.

Roads

Council's Technical Officer – Works Management, David Barwick and I went on a road tour of the north of the Shire to look at the recent flood damage. The trip was very informative as it highlighted where Council is up to with road repairs and upgrades. It was also wonderful to see the final stage of IB Bore Road that Gwydir Shire Council is completing on behalf of Moree Plains Shire Council. Once complete, this will see a full bitumen seal from North Star to the Newell Highway. Moree Plains secured funding for this section of road under the NSW Government's *Fixing Local Roads Program*.







Following damages which were incurred during flooding in September 2022, Transport for New South Wales has approved the replacement of a failed causeway at Glencoe on Killarney Gap Road with a new multi span bridge. The bridge is estimated to be 36m long (3 spans) x 9m wide (6m travel + 1.5 shoulders) with 18m approaches to match the existing layout of causeway. The total approved upper limit of funding for the works is \$6.169m, which will be funded under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements. There will be no cost to Council. Works will take up to two years as environmental approvals and engineering designs are required. This is very exciting news for road users that travel this stretch of road in the Shire as the new bridge will reduce the number of times that the road is closed due to storm and heavy rain events.

With last year's event being cancelled due to wet weather, it was fantastic to see horses back on the track! The Councillors and I would like to extend our congratulations to the Warialda Jockey Club organisers who worked tirelessly behind the scenes so that people could enjoy an excellent day out.

ANZAC Day

On behalf of my fellow Councillors, I would like to express what an honour it was for us to attend ANZAC services at Bingara, Warialda, Upper Horton, Crooble, North Star and Gravesend. The respect and spirit at each of these services was extremely profound and the atmosphere quite powerful.

Gwydir Libraries

Council's Library Services Coordinator, Gail Philpott and I attended the Central Northern Regional Library (CNRL) committee meeting at Kootingal Library on Wednesday 23 April. This was a great opportunity to learn about the amazing services we offer throughout the region and our own Shire.

The meetings are held twice a year to ensure Councils keep up to date with changes, procedures and new incentives.

Based in Tamworth, the CNRL serves 15 libraries, including the Warialda Library and Bingara Library based in the Gwydir Shire.

CNRL provides an extensive collection of print, audio visual and electronic resources as well as access to a range of downloadable content including e-audiobooks, e-books and e-magazines. Television, film and documentary streaming services are available to members.







Scanning, printing and photocopying facilities are also available at both the Bingara and Warialda branches.

CNRL will celebrate 75 years as a regional library service on Monday 1 September. The Gwydir Shire branches along with others in the region will celebrate by taking you back to the 1950's. You will step back in time to see how much libraries have changed and ponder what the future may hold.

Both Gwydir Libraries continue to be busy, people are visiting the libraries to sit and chat, seek assistance, use computers or access WiFi.

Membership to either of the Warialda or Bingara Libraries is free to all Shire residents.

The libraries are vibrant and relaxing spaces proving they are the hub of the community.

Residents of Touriandi Lodge and Naroo aged care facilities visit the libraries fortnightly to borrow resources, for craft activities, to chat, connect and enjoy morning tea.

After school programs continue to be well attended. Activities include book club, homework assistance, Lego, games, craft and sewing.

The *Challenge* group visit both branches for craft and a chat once a fortnight.

Home deliveries are offered to the aged and frail in the community.

Outreach programs are offered across the outer villages with staff planning visits to play groups, preschools and schools to host story times and activity sessions.

Tharawonga Day Care

Enrolments continue to grow at both the Warialda and Bingara Day Care facilities. At the time of writing this report, there were 13 children enrolled at the Bingara centre and nine children attending the Warialda facility on most operational days.

The learning environment has been alive with creativity, movement and discovery. Educators remain committed to fostering each child's development through engaging, ageappropriate experiences.

The day care service has been a long time coming for many families that now have the opportunity to return to work and increase their household income. It is amazing to see the number of families who have benefited from this wonderful service which is funded by the Australian Government Department of Education, Skills, and Employment.

Warialda Town Square

Council has continued work throughout the month of April on the Warialda Town Square project. Recent completed works include the electricity being connected to the block and underground wiring set throughout the park. At the time of writing, an irrigation system is being installed, and the boundary fence is nearing completion.



Construction on the amenities block has commenced, as well as concrete works. Shelters and furniture have been delivered, ready for installation once the concrete works are complete.

The trees and turf have been ordered. The project is still on track for completion by end of June 2025.

Bingara Administration Centre Project

The Bingara Administration Centre project remains on schedule despite some minor setbacks. The project contractor remains confident that they will be able to catch up and complete the project on time.

The terms of the mains power upgrade has now been agreed upon and the contractor will now proceed with the final design and lodgement of the necessary applications to the network provider.

Internal concrete tilt panels have now been erected with the concrete slabs around those tilt panels being poured. External concrete tilt panels are due onsite within the next two weeks.



Structural steelwork has arrived on site and has begun to be erected.

Piers for the concrete foundations to support the portal columns for the entry have been bored and steelwork installed with concrete to be poured next week.





Bingara Riverscape Project

Soil Con have commenced works on the Gwydir River Bingara. It is fantastic to see this project commence, and when complete the area will once again be a beautiful place to enjoy the river with friends and family.

The Roxy

It is also wonderful to see works commence at The Roxy.

These works will see an upgrade of the drainage system around the complex which will allow stormwater to leave the building quicker thereby minimising water damage to its structure and internal walls.



Further PFAS Testing for Water Supplies in Warialda

WEDNESDAY 7 MAY 2025

Since the detection of Per-and poly-fluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) in Warialda's water supply in December 2024, bores throughout the Warialda area have been undergoing further testing.

Owners of 20 properties had water supplies tested throughout April as part of the NSW Environment Protection Authority's voluntary testing program.

On two of those properties, PFAS was found to be above current and draft proposed drinking water guidelines. Another three properties indicated levels were above proposed drinking water guidelines.

However, the owners and residents all said these supplies were not used for drinking water. Six more properties showed levels of PFAS, but within acceptable limits.

All 20 properties have been informed of their results and precautionary advice has also been provided by the NSW Government's PFAS Technical Advisory Group on those properties where PFAS was detected.

NSW Health also recommends bore water should not be used for drinking, cooking and cleaning without testing and appropriate treatment.

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan said every effort is being made to keep the community informed.

"Given that PFAS had previously been detected in a water supply in Warialda, the latest results are not unexpected," Mr Moylan said.

"The NSW EPA will continue to offer further testing in May for any registered and unregistered bore-owners who have not already signed up for testing.

"I encourage property owners who have bores on their property to sign up when details are released for that program.

"Additionally, a community drop-in session will be held on Monday, 13 May at the Warialda Council Chambers to provide information and answer further questions."

The program supports Gwydir Shire Council's efforts to identify PFAS sources and secure a long-term safe water supply for the town. For information on the use of bore water, visit www.health.nsw.gov.au/environment/water/Pages/groundwater.aspx

Moylan Welcomes Review Into *Doli Incapax*

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan has welcomed news *doli incapax* in NSW is set for review.

Doli incapax is a common law legal presumption that children between the ages of 10 and 14 do not sufficiently understand the difference between right and wrong and therefore cannot be held criminally responsible in NSW.

It means the police prosecution is required to prove beyond reasonable doubt that the child, at the time of doing the act, knew it was seriously wrong as a matter of morality, or according to the ordinary principles of reasonable persons and not merely naughty or mischievous.

NSW Attorney General Michael Daley announced on Tuesday a review into *doli incapax* would be conducted by former Supreme Court Justice, the Honourable Geoffrey Bellew SC, and former NSW Police Deputy Commissioner, Mr Jeffrey Loy.

The review comes after the NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research (BOCSAR) released a report which found there's been a significant decline in the number of people aged 10 to 13-years-old found guilty after they are charged with a criminal offence.

Mr Moylan has been urging the NSW Government to conduct a review into *doli incapax* laws since joining Parliament in 2024 to ensure the community is protected but also to ensure young offenders are not simply released by the Courts without any intervention or assistance to stop them sliding into a cycle of crime.

"Our communities in regional and rural NSW are exhausted by serious crimes committed by young people," Mr Moylan said.

"The continual reliance by offenders on the doctrine of doli incapax hurts our communities, frustrates our police, and ultimately hurts young offenders as it contributes to a continuous cycle of reoffending.

"The review into *doli incapax* has been a long-time coming and is a constructive step to address the ongoing issue of youth crime.

"Hopefully it leads to meaningful reform to keep our communities safe and to stop the cycle of young people re-offending."



NSW Government Delivers \$10 million to Target High-Risk Weeds Control and Eradication

The Minns Labor Government is delivering \$10 million to local councils to target high-risk weeds across the state to protect the state's primary production and public land.

The NSW Government Weeds Action Program funds local councils, known as Local Control Authorities (LCA), to detect and respond quickly to incursions of new high-risk weeds.

The program focuses on prevention and early intervention to stop the spread of problem weeds by providing practical resources and on-ground support to ensure a proactive and coordinated response by LCAs.

Under the Minns Government the Weeds Action Program is focused on efforts to reduce the spread of invasive weeds to support healthy landscapes and strong agricultural productivity.

The NSW Government's program commissions LCAs to undertake services such as surveillance, and rapid response to prevent, eradicate or contain new infestations of priority weeds

In addition, the program funds training for LCA biosecurity officers so they can effectively respond to biosecurity emergencies across NSW.

LCAs make applications for funding under the program and need to demonstrate they are focusing on high-risk weeds to gain approved funding. This year the NSW Government has approved 92 funding applications from 86 LCAs.

In the News presents a roundup of current news of interest to local communities. Articles originally published by STA FM. Reprinted with permission. High-risk weeds targeted by the NSW Government's Weeds Action Program include:

Parthenium weed causes allergies and respiratory issues in people, liver damage in livestock and outcompetes pastures and crops. The program works to keep NSW Parthenium weed free through collaborative action and surveillance programs.

Rubber vine can invade pastures, waterways and natural areas, climbing up to 30 metres high. A major threat to grazing industries can cause livestock deaths. Found in Queensland, it could become a major weed in Western NSW.

Tropical Soda Apple (TSA), an aggressive, prickly, perennial shrub, invades open and semi-shaded areas in pastures, along rivers and in forests. It reduces biodiversity, displaces native plants and disrupts ecological processes. Its foliage is unpalatable to livestock. TSA is found on the North Coast, Mid-Coast, Hunter and New England areas.

Alligator weed has been found in the Namoi Valley, Griffith and Woomargama areas. It's a significant risk to irrigation and poses a threat to the Murray Darling Basin.

Harrisia cactus is a highly invasive weed which poses a serious threat to agriculture and native ecosystems. It reduces pasture productivity, hinders livestock movement and outcompetes native plants. Harrisia cactus is found in the North West and Hunter regions.

The program is funding significant face-to-face support from local councils to farmers and other land managers with expert advice, weed identification and management options.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development through its biosecurity and Local Land Services teams has a strong working partnership with the LCAs and communities, which supports protection of NSW's farmland, native bushland and waterways for future generations.

Minister for Regional NSW Tara Moriarty said:

"Weeds are a serious threat to our environment and economy, and our government is focused on investing this \$10 million to empower LCAs who work with community groups and farmers to protect their lands and livestock.

"This investment helps communities tackle invasive weed species head-on by supporting local management efforts, improving detection of these weeds and then responding with know-how and strong coordination between government agencies, councils and landholders.

"The Minns Government is committed to supporting our primary producers and regional communities manage these high-risk weeds, so we keep our landscapes healthy and productive."

bringing the issue to the attention of State Parliament's.

Mr Moylan says Harrisia Cactus, which is a nasty and aggressive plant that chokes out pastures to a level which is unsuitable for livestock, is causing great concern to the electorate, in particular in the Moree Plains and Gwydir Local Government Area's.

The MP says the barbs of the harrisia cactus will not come out when the plant is disturbed, so livestock and native animals essentially become trapped in the cactus, where they will die a very slow and painful death if they are not found by the landholder or neighbours.

Despite the government running a program to combat the weed, which ends this June, Mr Moylan called for the government to do more to stop the spread of this awful weed.

The Time for Change E-Petition, which was tabled in State Parliament yesterday, will be debated on May 29th.

The petition, which was signed by more than 22,000 people, is calling for more tougher laws and consequences as well as greater support for local police in addressing rural youth crime.

The petition calls on the government to strengthen bail laws to prevent violent young offenders from re-offending, provide increased resources and support for police officers to effectively apprehend and prosecute offenders, and review the judicial system to prioritise community safety.

The Northern Daily Leader reports Tamworth resident Phebe Furneaux started the Time for Change e-petition, which will now be debated on the floor of state parliament, giving rural communities a voice calling for change to make communities safer in the region.

The Nationals Barnaby Joyce has been emphatically returned as the member for New England following Saturday's federal election.

Tech Neck Time Bomb: Spinal Health Week Exposes Hidden Cost to Australians' Health & Productivity

With over 5.3 million Australians suffering from neck pain including Tension Neck Syndrome, a musculoskeletal disorder (MSD) commonly known as 'tech neck' or 'text neck', national Spinal Health Week (26 May to 1 June 2025) is dedicated to promoting spinal health and preventing the incidences of tech neck in Australians of all ages.

MSDs affect the joints, bones, muscles and multiple body areas (including the neck) and cost the Australian economy over \$55 billion annually through direct health costs, lost productivity and reduced quality of life.

Dr Billy Chow, President of the Australian Chiropractors Association (ACA) said, "With tech neck emerging as a growing global public health concern, together with the projected increase in MSDs over the next two decades, the health burden on Australians and our economy is and will continue to be significant."

"With over 34 million mobile phone connections and 95% of Australians accessing the internet via a smartphone, the focus of ACA's annual national Spinal Health Week is on encouraging Australians to adjust their thinking and take proactive steps to improve their spinal health and avoid debilitating tech neck," said Dr Chow.

"Once primarily experienced by seniors, with the advent of smart devices and wide-spread use of tablets and computers by people of all ages including children; we're seeing a growing number of younger patients in their 30s and 40s suffering from cervical spine disorders due to incorrect use of technology devices," he said.

Studies have shown smartphone and computer use can have a significant impact on pain severity among tech neck sufferers with the most prevalent symptoms of neck and back pain linked to the length of time spent using a device and the degree of discomfort experienced.

Caused by poor posture and the prolonged or incorrect use of digital devices, tech neck can lead to headaches, neck, shoulder and upper back pain that over time, can lead to changes to the natural curve of the cervical spine.

A recent study 'The Association Between Mobile Phone Usage Duration, Neck Muscle Endurance, and Neck Pain Among University Students' published in *Nature* (29.8.2024), examined the correlation between phone use, duration, addiction, neck muscle endurance, and neck pain in university students.

"Although the study focused on mobile phone use by

university students, with almost 87% of Australians now regular smartphone users and 75.5% being daily computer users, it's fair to consider the findings may be broadly applied to the population generally, particularly young people who've grown up using smartphones and tablets," said Dr Chow.

"While more studies are needed to better understand the implications of incorrect and overuse of technology on spinal health; to help prevent tech neck, we need to re-think how we use devices particularly young people who spend prolonged periods with their head bent forward viewing a smartphone," he said.

"When it comes to smartphones, not only must we monitor the length of time we use our devices, but we must be cognisant that overuse and the way we use them can negatively impact our spinal health as well as our mental health," Dr Chow said.

"The ACA recommends limiting recreational screentime to two hours per day, holding devices at eye level to prevent bending the neck forward, changing posture and taking regular breaks every ten minutes to look away from the device and move the neck from side-to-side."

"Computer use is also a primary cause of tech neck. Although most common among office workers, with 75.5% of Australians aged 16 to 64 using computers daily, incorrect use and computer set up can lead to a range of MSDs.

"Whether using a laptop or a desktop at home, school, university or at work; it's essential to take regular postural breaks every 30 minutes for movement and stretching and ensure workstations are set up ergonomically correct to help prevent tech neck, increase productivity and maintain overall spinal health and wellbeing,"

"During Spinal Health Week, we're encouraging all Australians to adjust their thinking on how they use smartphones, tablets and computers to help prevent persistent, aggravated head, neck and upper back injuries which impact productivity at home, school and at work," he said.





On June 5th 2015 it was stated in a tennis report that ...'It has been 79 years since Bingara held the first June long weekend tennis tournament and while the faces of the tournament committee members and players may have changed, the traditions of the tournament have remained steady.'

Over the years this tournament has played host to hundreds of players from all over the country, some of whom went on to become professional tennis players. 
