Australia's First Satellite to Mobile Texting Service has Landed

An exciting update from Telstra for anyone working, living or travelling in and around regional and rural Australia.

Telstra has unveiled its new Satellite Messaging service, which aims to enhance connectivity for Australians in remote and regional areas. The service allows users with compatible devices—specifically, the Samsung Galaxy S25 series and iPhone 13 through 16 (all models) on an eligible plan—to send and receive text messages via SpaceX's **Starlink** satellites when outside Telstra's mobile network.

The technology operates automatically: when a user is beyond mobile coverage and outdoors with a clear view of the sky, their device connects to the satellite network, enabling text communication. The service currently supports only text messages and doesn't facilitate voice calls, or emergency services like 000.

According to Telstra, satellite messaging is an intermittent service with the time it takes to send and receive messages dependent on your location, device, and the availability of **Starlink** Direct to Cell satellites. This means customers are likely to find that some messages are sent or received almost instantly, while others may take longer.

The service will mostly benefit people who live or travel outside mobile networks in regional and remote parts of the country, for the farmer in the back paddock who wants to check on when their family member will be getting back from town; for the outdoor



enthusiast on a hike checking in with family; or for road trippers experiencing a flat tyre and needing to reach out for help.

While the Satellite Messaging service promises to bridge some communication gaps, it has sparked mixed reactions among rural and regional communities. Regional residents have long expressed frustration over inconsistent mobile coverage and question whether this new service addresses the root issues or merely offers a temporary solution.

Naroo Frail Aged Care Facility

Naroo Frail Aged Care Facility has recently adopted a Household Model of Care in a recent wing expansion at the facility. Building works are complete and the finishing touches are now taking place.

The Household Model of Care in Australian aged care facilities is a person-centred approach designed to create a more homelike, empowering, and relationship-focused environment for older people. It departs from the traditional institutional or hospital-like model of aged care by reshaping both the physical environment and the care culture.

Key Features of the Household Model:

- 1. Small Living Units ("Households"):
 - Residents live in small groups, typically 8–12 people.
 - Each household has its own kitchen, dining area, and lounge, mimicking a private home.
 - Staff and residents form close, stable relationships within the household.
- 2. Person-Centred Care:
 - Emphasis on resident autonomy, dignity, and choice.
 - Daily routines are guided by the residents' preferences, not institutional schedules.
 - Residents are encouraged to participate in household activities such as cooking, gardening, and decision-making.



3. Consistent Staffing:

- Staff are consistently assigned to the same household, which fosters trust and deeper relationships.
- Roles are often broadened to include a mix of personal care, meal preparation, and social support tasks.

4. Home-like Environment:

- Physical design aims to be non-institutional with private rooms, soft furnishings, and accessible kitchens.
- The environment is designed to reduce confusion and promote well-being, particularly for residents with dementia.

Benefits:

- · Improved quality of life and satisfaction for residents.
- · Better outcomes in areas like emotional well-being, engagement, and reduced use of psychotropic medications.
- Stronger relationships between staff and residents.
- · Improved job satisfaction and retention of staff.

The 2021 Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety strongly endorsed the household model, recommending it as a preferred model for future residential aged care in Australia. The government has since supported pilot programs and infrastructure redesigns that align with this model.

What a great asset this model will be for the facility! Plus, what a benefit this adoption will provide the residents in care.

Day Care Centres

The Day Care Service now has 10 children attending in Warialda and 15 children attending in Bingara. May has been a busy month with meaningful, play-based learning, led by the children's interests taking place at both venues. Singing, dancing and sensory play are a focus for our educators and the children are responding well.

Gwydir Willoughby Youth Exchange

With less than a month to go, planning for the 2025 Youth Exchange Program is in full swing!

Staff are finalising the itinerary and confirming some exciting experiences for the participants. Information sessions were held at Warialda High School and Bingara Central School to encourage student participation in the 2025 Youth Exchange Program.

A large number of application forms were distributed, and we are hopeful for a strong response from interested students. The deadline is approaching fast, and we look forward to seeing the enthusiasm reflected in the applications received.

Wellness and Interpretive Centre

Works completed at the end of May 2025 on the Wellness and Interpretive Centre include external cladding, stormwater drainage and floor coverings to the office/ amenities. Glazing panels have also been installed in all doors and windows.

It is great to see this project coming together with so many items being ticked off the to-do list.

Telstra

The saga continues with the instability of Telstra service across the whole Shire. Again, outages occurred over the King's Birthday long weekend, causing frustration for residents of the Warialda, Gravesend and Coolatai areas.

Businesses were disrupted once again, and it is extremely concerning to the Councillors and I that if an emergency were to occur than there would be no way for people to contact emergency services during these periods.

Both The Hon Brendan Moylan, Member for Northern Tablelands and The Hon Barnaby Joyce, Member for New England are advocating for Gwydir residents to receive improved services. Council plans to meet Telstra on 18 June 2025, to see how we can improve services cross the whole of our Shire.

The Roxy

The stormwater and drainage site works are progressing well, and the project is on schedule to be completed by end June.

Council thanks North West Theatre Company and adjacent business owners who have been impacted by the works. It is much appreciated that we can work together and overcome short term inconveniences for great long term benefits.

The Living Classroom Cabins – Electricity Connection

The contractor who is to connect the high voltage electricity supply to The Living Classroom cabins has advised that this will be completed by 19 June 2025. Fingers crossed!

Gwydir River Foreshore

Works have paused onsite for a few weeks while Soil Conservation staff were seconded to the mid north coast to assist with flood recovery.

Soil Conservation has advised that they plan to be back the first week of July. During July a new pontoon will be installed. This pontoon will be removeable so that during future storm seasons and wet weather events the pontoon can be lifted out of the water and moved out to higher ground and, then repositioned after the threat has passed.

Site works will see the existing footpath connect to the pontoon.

Unfortunately, the recent riverbank restoration and site compaction could not save the river gum tree. The tree had to be removed for safety reasons.

The vast avenue of navel orange trees lining Finch Street was planted in the 1950s to commemorate Bingara's WWI and WWII fallen soldiers. Unique to Bingara, the trees have become a symbol of community pride and the focus of the annual Orange Picking Ceremony.

The original avenue of oranges planted along Finch Street between the RSL Club, and the Central School were valencias. But over the decades these were replaced with navels.

The oranges traditionally remain untouched until the nominated day. This year's ceremony will be celebrating its 65th anniversary and will be held on Friday 4 July at 11am.

Following a memorial ceremony which is held outside the Returned Services Club, the town's school children (the *Orange Police*) rush to harvest them.

Those lucky enough to be in Bingara during the harvest are also invited to join in this much-loved Bingara tradition.

This respect, self-discipline and pride in this unique memorial has been carried out since 1960, from one generation to the next. In some cases, those picking the fruit are the fourth or fifth generation to do so.

On Saturday 5 July the **Bingara Orange Festival – Bingara, Now and Then** will kick off from 10am.

The day is coordinated and hosted by members of the Bingara Special Events Committee who volunteer their time to ensure everyone has a fantastic day. The Committee is very excited to announce that Hugh Whitfeld will be announcing on the day.

The Festival boasts a Happy Days theme, and many will enjoy the rock n roll band Memphis Moovers and Sydney Swing Katz dancers. There will be stalls, crafts, a display in the library, great food and a grand parade at 2pm.

This year's Festival is proudly supported by the Bingara Community Op Shop (who has kindly donated \$2,000 for prizes), Bingara Wattle Arts and Craft, Bingara and District VISION 20/20, Regional Australia Bank and Gwydir Shire Council. There are many prize categories – see page 9 for more details.

If you want to find the perfect costume, try the Bingara Community Op Shop. The volunteers there have been busy sorting rock n roll, orange and vintage clothing.

This year's parade will be bigger and better with at least 12 community groups to participate. The Manilla Pipe Band will lead the parade which will start at 2pm.

The Festival is complemented by a 'ute barrel', rodeo and fireworks at the showground starting 3pm.

On Friday night enjoy a movie at The Roxy. The movie, *The Great Escaper* (NOT to be confused with the movie *The Great Escape*) will start at 6pm. Tickets are \$5 and there will be soft drinks and snacks available to purchase. *The Great Escaper* is a 2023 film starring Michael Caine and Glenda Jackson. The film tells the real story of Royal Navy veteran, Bernard Jordan, who "escaped" from his care home in June 2014 to attend the 70th anniversary of D-Day commemorations in Normandy. The night is a fundraiser for the Bingara Special Events Committee.

"It is fantastic to have people from our region honoured for dedication to their communities and their professions," Mr Moylan said.


"People from all walks of life and fields of expertise have been recognised for their contribution to their work."

Cyril 'Jimmy' Tanner received an OAM for service to rugby league in Armidale. Mr Tanner has fulfilled numerous roles in the sport at the Armidale Rams over many decades. He started out as a player in 1947 and has also performed as a coach, groundsmen, barbecue chef and fundraiser. Mr Tanner was also named the Greater Northern Region of NSWRL's Volunteer of the Year in 2019 as well as this year's NSW Seniors Festival Local Achievement Award.

Glen Innes' Jan Lemon received an OAM for her dedication to the local community. Ms Lemon serves on the Glen Innes and District Australia Day committee as the chairperson, spokesperson, master of ceremonies and secretary. She was named on the NSW Hidden Treasures Honour Roll. Ms Lemon is also a long-term committee member of the Lioness Club of Glen Innes, radio presenter at 2CBD and STA FM, a life member, president, treasurer, referee, canteen manager, and committee member of Glen Innes Basketball Association. She volunteers at the Glen Innes Show and fundraises for a number of charities within the region.

Max Eastcott received a Public Service Medal for his outstanding public service to local government and the Gwydir Shire. He has worked for more than 50 years at local government throughout NSW including Sydney and Byron Bay, before landing at Gwydir Shire Council in 2001. Mr Eastcott has overseen numerous initiatives and changes within local government. His list of accolades includes playing a key role in the successful amalgamation of Yallaroi, Bingara and part Barraba Shire Councils into the Gwydir Shire Council in 2004, being a driver of agricultural and educational programs within the region, having the Myall Creek Massacre and memorial site included as a place in the NSW Heritage Register, the refurbishment and redevelopment of the Roxy Theatre in Bingara, and much more.





Letters to the Editor

I am now 75 years old and have lived in Bingara for the last 10 years and would like take this opportunity whilst I am still healthy to express my gratitude in being a part of such a vibrant and caring community.

First impressions 12 years ago whilst staying at the caravan park – from viewing the wonderful Gwydir River just across the road, the really elegant shaped bridge, the huge tree with a root system so big that even I was small enough to explore from the inside and the gorgeous horses grazing contentedly along the river banks, to the bird life on the river and the Jasper rocks just everywhere by the coat ramp, then realising that the hospital was on one side of the caravan park and the swimming pool set amongst big shade trees was on the other—I felt delighted with it all.

Then to venture across the bridge into a town with wide streets, lovely houses all different from each other, each with gardens full of flowers and well kept lawns to the big well-manicured grounds of the public spaces from the golf course to the showgrounds, to the football oval to the cemetery.

Then to wander down the main street to discover the beautiful old buildings, to watch people stop anywhere to chat with each other, to then see The Roxy where posters in the windows showed there is a very thriving theatre company here. It was at this point that I realised that I was going to come and live here. Which I did, two years later.

Over the years I have been here I have been so impressed with the amount of care, creativity and compassion there is in this community.

From the welcoming churches, the staff at the medical centre, the information centre, the council offices, the library, the HAC people who drive us to medical appointments miles away from Bingara, the chemist, the post office staff who help us understand the confusing technology to pay our bills, the elderly citizens club, the caring hospital staff, the ambulance people and the Westpac helicopter pilots and Touriandi—we are so well looked after with compassion and dignity from all concerned. Thank you, people of Bingara.

For the wonderful donations that are dropped off for our op shop to be resold and reloved—thank you, people of Bingara. It is such a joy to be able to recirculate absolute treasures back into the local community and give support financially from the proceeds back into our community at the same time.

From the creative work that we see every year at the craft shop, in the annual show pavilion, the flower show and the

quilting displays at the Wireman Crowley Hall and the Op Shop's fashion parades, as well as the North West Theatre Company's productions, we can enjoy so much that is of visual interest. As well as the sporting events, of course.

The town's museum is also absorbing. From the wonderfully rich connections to their past people here have donated absolute treasures, whether it be local gemstones, carriages, everyday items from pioneering living, old machinery, school collections to war memories in the new Military Museum—most certainly a very classy museum from such a little town.

The quiet nights are often filled with millions of stars, the protective barking of the dogs and occasionally an owl, can be heard just before dawn. We live in a town where neighbors watch out for each other, where there is incredible respect for the men of this town who went off to fight in two world wars and never returned. Bingara's Anzac Day celebrations and ceremonies are truly special. As is the Orange Picking Ceremony held each year in July outside the RSL run by the students at Bingara Central School.

I remember the first year I was at this ceremony the *Advance Australia Fair* anthem was accompanied by an upbeat didgeridoo rhythm which filled me with joy and excitement. I was convinced then that Bingara school people had come up with the perfect answer to Reconciliation between the Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples of this country by connecting through music a vibrant and harmonising anthem that would certainly aid the cause of Reconciliation far better that any other way for the youth of our country to take into the future.

Two other images that stay in my mind—the first one being the sight of the HUGE agricultural machinery that can be maneuvered down Cunningham Street into the main street and no one blinks an eye, and the second one being the sight of Wadey running alongside heaps of horses and keeping up with them along the track down to the river and the horses all following him so simply and easily. So impressive to see. Just another example of the magic in this town.

I remember the first year of the Pulse Festival out at The Living Classroom and how valuable that festival was in bringing a number of young families to live at Bingara because they felt that this town was going to be the right place for them to bring up their children.

And I could go on and on about how much fun it is to live in this town ...to be a volunteer is a great way to stay connected to the pulse of Bingara, to help form the future. Bingara is such a special place and I am so proud and happy to be living here.

How can road trauma in regional NSW be reduced?

Last year close to 70 per cent of the state's road fatalities occurred in regional NSW.¹ A new inquiry by the Committee on Road Safety is looking into what work can be done to reduce regional road trauma caused by speeding, fatigue, drink and drug driving.

"Regional communities continue to have a disproportionately high number of road fatalities and it is important that we look for interventions to combat road trauma on regional roads," said Committee Chair, Greg Warren MP.

"Our inquiry is looking at whether current strategies and programs are effective in reducing driving risk factors, such as fatigue, speeding and drink driving, that increase the likelihood of road crashes."

The Committee would like to hear from a range of stakeholders on this important issue and are inviting submissions from regional and rural community members, road safety experts, community organisations, local councils, first responders and healthcare workers.

Stronger Laws to Stop Puppy Farms and Improve Animal Welfare Introduced

Dog breeders across NSW can now apply for exemptions to new puppy farming regulations to ensure they satisfy changes coming into effect on 1 December 2025.

Under the NSW Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Amendment (Puppy Farming) Act 2024, breeders can have no more than 20 female adult dogs, which are not desexed and older than six months, on any premise.

Only dog breeders who had more than 20 female adult dogs when the maximum cap became law on 21 November 2024 can apply for a 10-year exemption from this limit until 1 December 2035.

Breeders who had more than 50 female adult dogs (and who are granted an exemption) are required to bring the number down to 50 or below by 1 December 2026.

If a breeder is refused a 10-year exemption, they must comply with the maximum cap of 20 female adult dogs from 1 December 2025.

Applications for an exemption can be made to the Office of Local Government (OLG) for a \$550 fee, giving dog breeders time to manage and appropriately scale down their businesses to comply with the Puppy Farming Act.

This will avoid potential adverse animal welfare outcomes and negative impacts on pounds and rehoming organisations.

Exemption applications will be open until Sunday 13 July 2025 on the OLG website: https://www.petregistry.olg.nsw.gov.au/temporary-exemption-application

The NSW Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) is working with the OLG to ensure breeders, potential breeders, occupiers of dog premises and the community understand the new requirements.

DPIRD Executive Director Strategy and Regulatory Policy, Peter Goth, said the robust changes ensure animal welfare standards are upheld.

"This legislation ensures transparency, accountability and appropriate animal welfare standards in all dog breeding operations across NSW."

"These changes will fortify and support animal welfare within the industry and allow people to choose puppies from ethical breeders who promote responsible dog breeding."

Changes to address key risks to animal health and welfare related to dog breeding practices that commence from 1 December 2025 include:

- All dog breeders must obtain a mandatory Breeder Identification Number through the NSW Pet Registry and include this number along with the microchip number of the dogs they are advertising for sale or giving away, to improve transparency and ensure people purchasing a new puppy know where their dog is coming from.
- New lifetime breeding limits for female dogs with a maximum of five litters in total or up to three caesarean litters with veterinarian approval, whichever occurs first.
- One staff carer for every 20 adult dogs, to ensure dogs receive a minimum standard of care.
- A maximum penalty for individuals of \$110,000, two years imprisonment or both, and \$550,000 for organisations for breaches of these requirements.

Low paid workers in the region are set to receive a 3.5% pay increase following an announcement from the Fair Work Commission yesterday.

From July 1, the minimum wage will be increased from \$24.10 per hour, to \$24.94 an hour.

Commission President Adam Hatcher says low-paid Australians had been "squeezed" amid the period of high inflation, and acknowledged that real wages had effectively gone backwards since July 2021.

The Australian Council of Trade Unions called for a 4.5% increase to address years of workers falling back in real terms while the Council of Small Business Organisations Australia, which represents smaller employers like cafes and restaurants, pushed for a rise of between 2 to 2.5 % to alleviate the stresses on businesses struggling to get by saying the pay rise as well as the increase to mandatory superannuation contributions coming into effect, would force many to lay off staff or shut their doors.



When Village Meets Vintage

As light showers and fog scattered the Gwydir Shire on an otherwise unremarkable autumn mid-May day, a robust band of lovers of all things vintage machinery came together on a field, in a village, to make the day exceptional.

The Coolatai Vintage Tractor Pull is a weekend-long annual gathering of kindred folk who radiate an enthusiasm for all things mechanically "classic" or "vintage". Whilst some in attendance were owners/drivers, the love for these machines and their robust capabilities emanated to spectators, who ranged in age from toddler to those even more "vintage" than the machinery.

The event is not a race, but an opportunity to test the pulling capacity of tractors at least 30 years of age. For the uninitiated, questions as to how this is achieved are heightened when viewing the set-up of the sled to be pulled. The sled consists of a metal plate, laid on the ground, with a concrete weight atop. This weight moves further forward as the pull progresses, increasing resistance and thus making it more difficult for the tractor to move. A red flag is raised by a volunteer to indicate once the tractor is no longer making forward progress and thus has "finished". The distance the weight has progressed is measured by a ruler of sorts.

Whilst the rules and regulations associated with the event may seem rigorous, they are required for the sake of fairness and safety. These include limits on modifications, the placement of hands during un/hooking, and the necessity of safety officers.

Technicalities aside, what ensued over the course of the weekend was a combination of beaming faces, gentle rounds of applause, random cries of "woohoo", and a warm village atmosphere. Conversations and catch-ups were intermittently interrupted by the cacophony of diesel engines grunting or public address announcements about horse power of machines.

Children aspiring to become future owners/drivers of vintage tractors were accommodated in a down-sized event, allowing them to pull jerry can weights behind ride-on lawnmowers.

The weekend in its totality offered opportunities to participate in a carp cull, view other vintage machines in action, purchase knick-knacks, jewellery and accessories, and even take home a sample of freshly sheared wool. Food and beverages were in abundance, allowing a caffeine fix during the day and a cold beverage later in the day.

Many in attendance took advantage of the ability to camp overnight, with updated bathroom facilities and close proximity to the Wallaroo Hotel. An auction at the hotel rounded out events on Saturday, with more machinery-based action taking place Sunday morning.

It must be said, for the mere pittance of a gold coin donation for entry, experiences like this and the generous people who commit their time to them are such a boon to rural communities. What a pleasure it was to attend, and may the Coolatai Vintage Tractor Pull be an ongoing feature of the Gwydir Shire every year.


